

TRADES COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Portland, Ore., Oct. 26, 1906.
Meeting of Portland Federated Trades Council called to order at 8 o'clock by President Ledwidge.

Minutes of previous meeting accepted as read.

Credentials—Building Laborers Union, Wm. Slater, Chas. Miner and Fred Harmon; Painters, F. M. Thompson and E. E. Padden; Photo-Engravers, A. Vanderkalk.

Communications—From Woman's Union Label League extending an invitation to the Council to attend an open meeting of the league to be held November 8 at Drew Hall, at which time a short program will be rendered and then all are expected to "eat, drink and be merry." A motion was adopted that the invitation be accepted.

From the Woman's Union Label League stating that on investigation they had found a full line of union made shoes at Goddard & Kelly's, Communication filed.

From Street and Electric Railway Employees calling attention to the grand ball to be given under the auspices of their organization on the 27th inst. Filed.

Bills—The following bills were approved by the trustees and ordered paid: W. H. Fitzgerald, salary for month, \$20; postage and telegrams, \$5.85; Miss Lucy White, salary for month, \$5; P. J. Smith, hall rent, \$11; tax to Oregon State Federation of Labor, \$1.50.

New Business—Messrs. H. D. Wagon, Geo. Himes and A. O. Nelson, a committee having in charge a movement to change the system of taxing the water consumer, was admitted and explained in detail the merits of the ordinance they propose to submit through the initiative and referendum law.

On report of the Grainhandlers that the strike on the water front had been settled, a motion was adopted that Allen & Lewis be removed from the unfair list.

Delegate Goldrainer introduced the following resolution, which was given first reading and laid over to next meeting for final action:

"1. No name of any firm or corporation shall be placed on the unfair list, unless through a communication from a union with seal attached.

2. Before placing any name on the unfair list it must be referred to the proper committee for investigation.

3. No name shall be removed from the unfair list unless by request from the directly affected union, in writing with seal attached."

Several delegates spoke on the advisability of the Council holding a union label fair or a bazaar such as is the custom now in other parts of the country. After considerable discussion a motion prevailed to appoint a committee to investigate and make some recommendations along these lines. The President appointed Brothers Leabo, Fitzgerald, McDonald, Herr and Kelly.

Reports of Organizations—The Grainhandlers reported that their difficulties with the exporters had come to an end, that while they did not secure all that they were entitled to, under the new agreement conditions will be much improved.

The Electrical Workers reported that they have secured assistance from their International Union and intended to vigorously force the fight against the Home Telephone Company in the future.

The Cooks and Waiters reported having moved to a new hall at 128 1/2 Fifth street, and recommended that their new headquarters would be a convenient place for the Council to meet. A motion was adopted that a committee be appointed to investigate the Cooks' and Waiters' new hall and report at next meeting.

Receipts—Laborers, \$5; Beer Bottlers and Drivers, \$3; Cigarmakers, \$3; Electrical Workers, \$9; total, \$2. Disbursements, \$43.35. Meeting adjourned.

HUMAN HEARTS.

Hal Reid's well known masterpiece is so well known that it requires very little to be said about the plot. It is a beautiful heart story, interwoven with villainy, pathos, love and comedy. home four years later; this little child's (Adele Banks) prayer; the vision of Tom in jail. Then the pleading of Mrs. Logan and her Lilly Love (C. McFarland) to the Governor, for Tom's relief, which he grants. Tom is released and finds his child. The villain is beaten. So in despair he kills Jeannette. This is one of the most charming heart dramas ever written. It will also serve to introduce some new faces; Mr. Elsworth, a well known actor from the East; also the Lyric's old favorite, Lillian Griffiths. The management is sparing no expense to mount this piece. New scenery is being specially prepared; everything is being done to make this the most complete production ever presented at this theatre.
