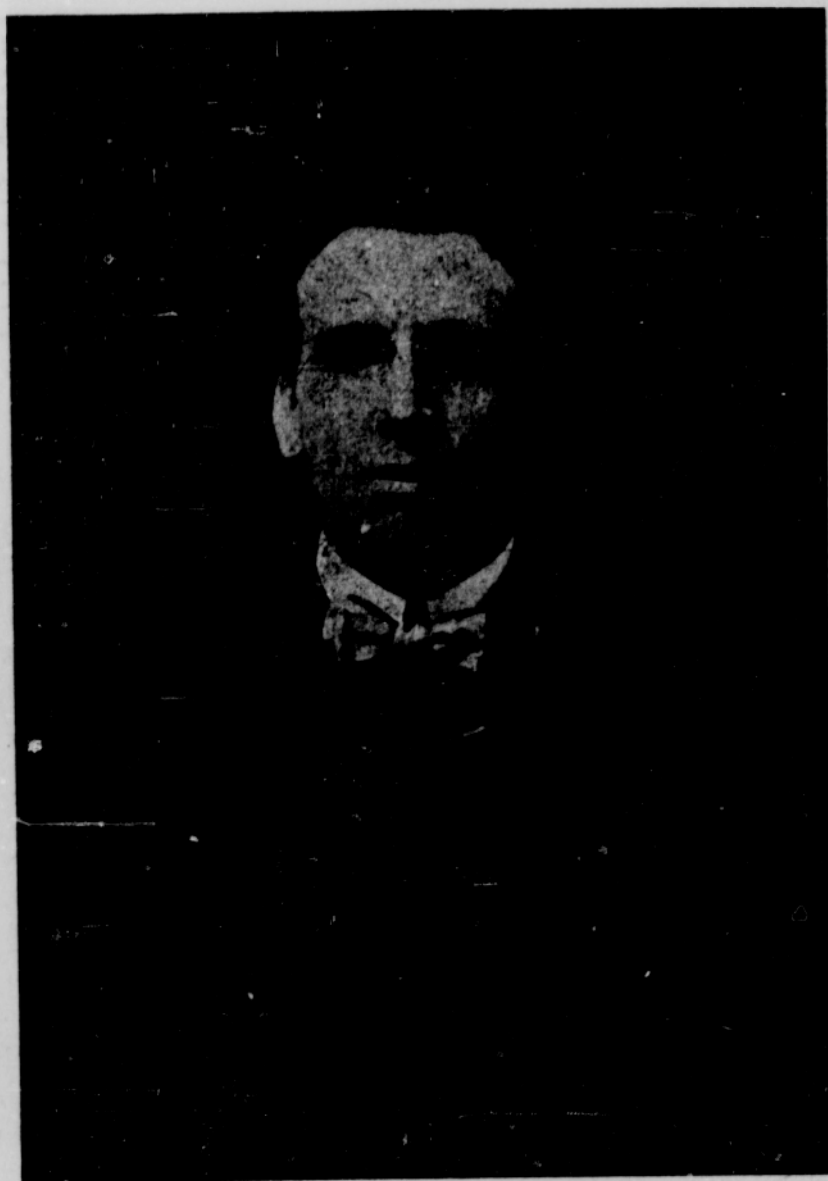

but the proud man's contumely? Remember, brothers, we have rights in this land of freedom which have been ignored because of the obsequious tools occupying public place. Let us be alive on this occasion; you cannot fail to see the game that's being played by the rich corporations and the vested interests—a game that leaves us who are obliged to struggle for a mean existence in the icy grasp of chill penury.

Should we lose our choice for mayor and allow an antagonistic city council to steal a march by electing a majority of hostile members, what would be our chance in this city to obtain anything approaching "The Square Deal?"

Be at the polls early, friends, and see that your fellow working men cast their votes for our ticket.

During the early stages of the Municipal Campaign and shortly after the organization of the Labor Party a constant stream of correspondence from candidates seeking the union support flooded the secretary's office. It is a significant fact that not a candidate now in the field for the mayoralty failed to pay his obedience to the party and humbly crave the working men's support.

Now, we hear considerable criticism concerning the endorsement of the Labor Party given Mr. Coffey, but supposing the same had been given either of the other Republican candidates how would the ELECT element which is now supporting Mr. Devlin, for instance, look upon the circumstance? Would those straight-faced individuals turn up their noses at the labor role, as they are now doing, had it been given to Mr. Devlin? He asked for it, and made specific pledges in consideration of said vote.

But Mr. Devlin did not win the support of organized labor because there was nothing in the shape of RECORD that could be set before the electorate as a medium of judgment upon Mr. Devlin and his possible career as a public official. In the case of Mr. Coffey it is quite different. He has served in the capacity of a public servant with power to legislate, and in the exercise of that great power, he showed him-

self a friend of the wage-earner. Do not snarl and twist your proboscis at this statement, you union haters, of whom we have an over stock in this belated city, just sit up and admit that we have the drop on your fellows on this occasion and can use your avowed antagonism to the rights of labor as a "big stick," and you rascals, you feel it. The poor toiler now has you fast in his death grip upon the windpipe and no relaxation will be given.

Our duty is to stand for the man who stands for us; no soft soap business about this proposition. Other men may be good citizens and all that sort of thing, but when it comes to DOING THINGS Coffey is the man, and our votes GO to him—not Devlin, not Kelleher.

Brother Chris Lollick of the Beer-drivers' and Bottlers' Union claims

to be serving the cause of unionism as effectively as any of our workers—He says he has added one more to the number who, he hopes, will be trained in the "straight and narrow way," but the bird called the Stork may claim some of the honor in this connection.
