FRED C. KING, THE CHOICE OF THE PEOPLE FOR COUNCILMAN FROM THE FOURTH WARD.

LITHOGRAPHERS' STRIKE ENDED.

As a result of a form of agreement submitted by the employers and ratified by a referendum vote of the lithographers, the prolonged strike is at an end. The new treaty provides for the return of the lithographers to work, with a fifty-one-hour week, and a reduction of one hour per week at six-month intervals until the eight-hour day is reached, which will be July 1, 1908. Only union men are to be employed unless the union is unable to furnish competent men, when non-union men may be employed until such time as the union is able to furnish union men. Wages and all conditions in the shop are to remain the same as prior to the strike.

HANDS OFF.

It has been a practice (and we guess will continue), for fakirs of infinite brands to besige Labor Unions to lend their influence and prestige to advance some scheme, which is to put money in the pockets of private individuals.

Labor unions are not organized for any such purpose. They are not a channel or turn-pike road for everybody to use as a boulevard, in order to enjoy special privileges or to be princely accommodated.

The unions are organized and maintained for the benefit of the members directly and to promote the cause of labor reform in the commercial relations of the business world.

The union, as such, cannot even take political action without causing a ripple, and very often a storm of dissension among the members.

It is certainly not an unnatural position, for a body composed of political elements more or less equally divided between parties, to be antagonized by any proposition which is hostile to ones party notions; therefore, unions are careful not to espouse the cause of party questions or to endorse candidates, even if they are members.

Labor unions are wise in being shy of any ugly reptile they may see crawling in their doors. For their is always some mischief lurking in the winsome smile, and some advantage in view. In fact, this is generally the methods of people who have no use for labor unions only to use them for selfish purposes. Hands off.—Ex.

RAILROAD MEN GET INCREASE.

The Burlington Railroad Company has advanced the wages of all employees, except the trainmen and telegraphers, 10 per cent.

The trainmen's schedule of wages is fixed by conference; the telegraphers recently secured a substantial increase.

In the Omaha offices alone, the increase will represent about \$50,000 a year.

HOTEL PORTERS ON STRIKE.

In New York, last Thursday, the porters in 20 of the largest hotels quit work to enforce their demand for the full amount of tips and a minimum scale of wages of \$25.00 per month. This wage includes board.

It has been the custom for the head porters to claim part of the tips, the strike is a fight against the position of the chief porters.

MACHINISTS STRIKE.

The machinists employed by the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company went out on a strike the 29th ult., in support of their demand for recognition of the Union and a uniform scale of wages.

About 700 machinists are employed on the system, and it is hoped the whole force will affiliate with the organization and force the company to accede to their legitimate demands.
