

ATTEMPTS TO DECEIVE AS TO STRENGTH OF UNIONS

The Employers' Association, in circular letters to its members, counts as "unorganized" every soul that does not belong to a labor union affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, and then figures that organized labor in Portland has but seven per cent of a half per cent.

There are different ways of figuring, and the falsehood that organized labor is but a very small percentage of the men of this city in its ranks is where the Employers' Association trips up in its plans every little while. It is bad policy to under-estimate the enemy's strength. Any great general knows that.

There were about 30,000 votes cast in Multnomah County at the last state election. If we count 40,000 men as being in the city of Portland, we will not be accused of skimping the estimate.

There are thousands who are ineligible, because in occupations and professions where they have organizations of their own. The lawyers, doctors, teachers, dentists, real estate men, grocers, merchants, capitalists, etc. These men are all closely organized into labor unions under different names and constitutions—but labor unions, just the same.

The Employers' Association itself is but a labor union, for all it antagonizes all other labor unions, and especially the American Federation of Labor kind.

It is safe to say that of the assumed 40,000 men in Portland fully 10,000 are in business or professional unions and near-unions. In the mechanical trades and callings there are fully 7,500 members of unions of one kind and another. This would leave 22,500 unorganized men, of which quite a large number would be ineligible because of age. Many of these would join a union tomorrow if they dared.

Others belong to political and economic organizations such as the Socialists, I. W. W., Christian Philosophers and so on, whose sympathies are more with organized labor than with the Employers' Association or special privileges of any sort.

It is doubtful if 5,000 men are even mildly antagonistic to organized labor in this city, and those men are largely the unthinking middle and upper classes.

The unorganized actual working man as a rule is not antagonistic to organization. All he wants is the results, and does not care for the struggle, or does not dare to struggle, for the betterment of mankind in general and himself in particular.

Of the 30,000 men that as an extreme estimate are eligible to organized labor's ranks, fully 25 per cent are organized and 25 per cent additional are held back by the force of circumstances from organizing.

Of the organized industries many of them are over 90 per cent card men. Others range down to 50 per cent. In proportion to their

organization is their pay, without an exception. Given the pay a man gets, and you can tell the degree of the organization of his craft.

Organized labor in Portland can increase its membership and will do so with two or three general organizers in the field. There are large numbers of men and women in different occupations waiting to be approached by representatives of the A. F. of L.

But when some Employers' Association agent, or dupe, tells you that unless than one man out of ten is organized, it is to laugh at him for a fool. Ask him how many lawyers are unorganized. Ask him how many clergymen are unorganized. Then ask him why they organized and established wage schedules or working conditions.

The Employers' Association walking delegates are imploring business men to organize and fight organized men with the same inalienable rights as themselves. When these business men learn that in conciliation, arbitration and mutual respect there is more than in fighting other organizations, the forces of organized labor in Portland will be 100 per cent. Haste the day.

SOCIALISTS OF LOS ANGELES DEMAND SINGLE TAX.

In Los Angeles the Socialists are not hide-bound nor blind partisans. They have adopted the principles of the single tax and unhesitatingly announce them, taking up the greater portion of the platform adopted on August 6th with pointing out the need for taxation of land values and the existence of an immense unused fund belonging to the people scarcely touched by present systems of taxation. It runs as follows:

"Believing that the enormous unearned increments that attach to land are a social creation and belong of right to the people who create them, we declare that these social values should be taken into the public treasury by taxation or otherwise and that the burdens of taxation should correspondingly be reduced from the products of labor and the small homes and savings of the class on whom these burdens now fall with unjust and crushing weight. No progressive policy for the socialization of our public utilities, or the extension of any public service, is safe, or indeed possible, unless accompanied by a sound and scientific policy of municipal taxation. It is one thing to buy and build. It is another to pay. It is one thing to issue bonds for public improvements; it is quite another, and more vitally important element of city administration to secure city revenue without piling up a heavy debt upon the taxpayers, and pouring out a perpetual tribute of interest to the money-lenders. We are opposed to any city administration heaping upon us heavy bond issues without coming forward with a municipal budget that will take the burdens of taxation off the backs of the common people.

"In our campaign we shall unceasingly place before the electors that most sure, most scientific, and most just source of city revenue, viz: the unearned increment of land values in its two forms of (1) site values, and (2) franchise values. The city itself is the greatest creator of wealth in its own domain. There is a veritable gold mine, ever increasing, under the city. The city itself creates values annually, more than ample for all improvements and expenditures in that continually unsleeping increase which the normal growth of the city adds (1) to all the land values over which it stands, and (2) to all the public franchises within its limits.

"No individual creates these values by labor, foresight, capital, or skill. They are socially created by the presence and activities of the whole community. And the land values which the whole community thus socially creates should naturally become the source of the city's treasure. But our present method of real estate taxation and of dealing with franchise values is unjust and disastrous. It punishes the man who improves real estate and rewards the owner of land kept vacant. It leaves the value which the city creates to fall into private hands which never earned it, while it collects taxes out of the people's earnings and values which the city did not create.

"Therefore, along with our program for the municipalization of public utilities, thus saving to the city and to the citizens the enormous value of public franchises, we demand an increase in the assessment of all land values of the city, and a uniformity of assessment according to location and site value, whether improved or unimproved. We favor a decrease in the assessment of improvements. We further propose to agitate for a charter amendment to come before the people at the next election providing for the levying of an additional tax on all unimproved land. In New Zealand 68 cities have adopted this principle of taxation of the unearned increment of land values with unflinching success. It is this principle which is now unshoring the landed aristocracy of Great Britain. Taxation of the unearned increment of land values and the socialization of public utilities is the secret of a full city treasury, collected from the city's own socially created values and providing abundant revenue for every needed municipal enterprise without robbing the poor and the working classes and enriching the rich and the privileged."

Three years more and a provincial parliament will be called to meet for all Ireland. Religious, sectional and political feeling is very strong. It is expected to reduce the bitterness and avoid the evils of dominant factions by use of some form of the preference vote.
