A COLD, CRUEL WORLD.

Much of the land in England was paying taxes on a valuation made 270 years ago. The land owners showed as much anguish of soul over the proposition to pay hereafter on a real valuation of a two-mill tax as the Oregonians show over the proposal to make it pay on its vacant land and timber holdings 50 per cent more. My, how they did roar! Then the land bill added a 20 per cent tax on all future increases of value over the new valuation. That is just beginning to make the British lords just stars. Now it is pro-

posed to level the cities and towns to collect as much more as the general government. Imagine the predicament of a vacant lot owner in England. The poor wretch dare not undervalue it, for if he does a sale will take up 20 per cent of the difference. He dare not overvalue it, for that means more taxes. It is getting to be a cold, cruel world to a man in England with a piece of land he has no use for and will not let anybody else use.

### HORSES EVER YOUNG.

The development of 24,000 horse-power in a new plant of the Portland Railway, Light and Power Company in Clackamas County means that a natural resource belonging to the people of Oregon is to be confiscated without any expectation of paying a cent into the public treasury for this wealth. There are less than 7,000 horses in this county, assessed at \$53.40 each, mostly belonging to farmers. There are 400,000 horses in Clackamas County that never grow old, will work 24 hours a day and require no feed, and do not cost as much to harness as a farmer's horse, yet they are practically untaxed. Then farmers ask where the taxes are going to come from if taxes are taken from improvements. A farmer's quadruped horse is taxed a little over a dollar a year. If the water power was taxed a dollar a year per horse-power, it would pay more than all the taxes now levied on personal property and improvements in Clackamas County.

There is no need of members of any church taking money from its contribution box to hire detectives because a brother has been caught passing counterfeit money; and the labor unions are not going to hire detectives to hunt up accessories to crimes of violence. Their money is needed for other purposes. The community is taxed to support the officers of the law. Let them do their duty. No labor union supports or endorses crime any more than a church; or as much as some churches.

Organized labor stands firmly where it always has on the question of violence. Everlastingly opposed to its use or having it used in industrial disputes. Always in favor of arbitration and conciliation. This does not mean that it will abandon the boycott, the strike, the business representatives or take the advice of its enemies and disband.

In New York there are more kinds of charity and philanthropy than any place on earth; and the more they dole out alms the more misery and graft flourishes. Indeed some people believe that the big grafters encourage charity to be the more secure in their big business undertakings.

Mariposa, County, California, is likely to give itself to adjoining counties. Land monopolists will not break up holdings, and population has dwindled. Needs single tax badly. Likely to get it soon, extinct as a county or not.
