THE "COMMON" MAN.

A prominent Eastern socialist actively advocated a "Home Colony," from which the "ignorant," the "vulgar," and the "snobbish," were to be excluded. He would have no place for them in his model social community. I wonder where some of us common people would come in on such a scheme for human society? To be sure, any company of men have a perfect right to form an exclusive colony, so that they may be rid of the men and women and children who are poor and ignorant, unlovely and unfortunate, but the fact remains that the great majority of us are just these things, and we simply must be reckoned with.

If the unusually gifted are to withdraw from our society, daintily touching us with kid gloved hands, then it is going to fare ill with us, for we need all the inspiration and the help that we can get from our fellowmen. I was going to say, but perhaps they would object to being called that.

But, seriously, we cannot get away from the fact that any movement, to really succeed, must take into account all the sin and the meanness that lie deep in the hearts of men, for most of us are mean and selfish.

Furthermore, such a plan as is being advocated, was tried by some of the choicest spirits that could be gotten together, and it failed miserably. It failed because there was too much human nature about the men and women who constituted that famous colony.

Others have attempted to form exclusive colonies, and exclusive religions, too, but never have they succeeded.

Somehow, it must be a good thing to be compelled to mingle with even the ignorant and the vulgar. For never yet has it failed that exclusiveness bred selfishness and contempt for the masses of the people, of whom God made so many. Jesus Christ, in praying for his disciples, said: "I pray not that Thou shouldst take them out of the world." The world needs the best that God has given men.

The real test of a social system or of a religious system is its ability to take the very worst man and make him a good man.

The Apostle Paul once declared himself to be the "chief of sinners," and that means everything that is snobbish and mean, besides a great many other things. But he also said that he had been redeemed from these things by the power which came alone through the gospel which is preached.

There are millions of others who have passed through the same experience.

The "common" man—he is the fellow who must be met on his own ground, and no real progress can be made unless we take him with us.

SPEAKS FOR PARCELS POST.

Representative of Woman's Trade Union League Speaks Before Committee.

Representing the Woman's Trade Union League, of New York City, Miss Leonora O'Reilly appeared before the Senate Committee on Postoffices and Post Roads, January 6, in behalf of a parcels post. She particularly emphasized the value of a parcels post service in the development of a small and scattered rather than large, centralized industries.

She asserted that with an efficient parcel post as a means of reaching customers, women could start co-operative work shops making shirt waists and similar articles of clothing and thus avoid working in sweat shops and fire-trap factories.

Miss O'Reilly also voiced vigorous protest against the plan of referring the parcel post question to a commission. She said that the creation of a commission is generally a means of delaying a needed improvement, but the people of the country want action, not delay, on the subject of parcel post.

Senator Bourne, of Oregon, is chairman of the Senate Postoffice Committee and is an advocate of the parcel post.

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WOMEN WIN IN OHIO.

Washington.—The 9-hour law recently enacted by the Legislature of Ohio, for the protection of women wage earners, in a test case before Judge Dillon, of Columbus, was decided by him to be constitutional. His ruling, it is expected, will be appealed to the higher courts of the State, and it is further expected that in line with decisions in other states upon the question of hours of working women, the Supreme Court of Ohio will confirm the decision just returned by Judge Dillon.

ACCIDENTS IN CANADA.

Washington.—During the month of November 95 persons were killed and 191 injured in Canadian industries, or a total of 286 fatal and non-fatal accidents. This was a considerable improvement over the record for the month of November, 1910, in which 407 casualties occurred, 140 being fatal, and 267 non-fatal.
