COMPARE THE LISTS.

In Albany the tax rate will be 29 mills. It beats all how the tax rate will crawl up in a progressive town. If the people of Albany would investigate the subject of taxation they would find that the tax rate does not crawl up because of public needs and improvements, but because under present law the assessing authorities permit assessed values to remain station-ary, or nearly so, while actual values go up enormously. In Albany it would be easy to find land values in the business part of the city escaping its just propor-

tion of the public burdens to more than reduce the levy 50 per cent. The kickers at high taxes do not compare the rolls of the assessor with the price lists of the real estate agents. If they did there would be something done.

LET THE PUBLIC DO IT.

When the business part of Portland was covered with snow every foot of sidewalk was cleared on Washington street right away, all but the Pittock block. That property, worth not less than \$1,500,000 and assessed for a little over 34 per cent of its value, was not cleared until the temperature rose and the rain washed the snow away. It is the humble home of the publisher of the Oregonian, increasing in value 20 per cent every year, but on the assessment rolls about 6 per cent, and its owner is too poor to have the snow shoveled off 200 feet of sidewalk.

The public pays for gas and water mains, street cars and all the services of the city. It piles up the increased and unearned values on this practically empty block of land for nothing, and since it is giving him not less than \$300,000 a year to hold it out of use the public should shovel the snow off the sidewalks and not rob a poor old man by taxing his land values to do so. The Journal published a photo of the sad scene and offered a dollar to the first man who would tell what block it was.

WATER SHOULD BE FREE.

Corvallis has a municipal water system that is on a very successful basis. It has expended a great portion of its receipts in extensions and improvements during the past year. There is no reason why the water should not be free in that city, or any other, except that idle lot speculators do not like to pay for water they do not use and the users do not know enough to pass a just share of the expense on to the speculators. The latter always add to the price of a lot the value of the public services of water, but never willingly pay for the value the community creates and puts in their pockets.

ONE-SIDED RESOLUTIONS.

Clackamas County Grange has resolved against the Single Tax. The advocates of this principle were not asked to present their side of the question. Every man or woman present knew that there could be no such resolution passed after a friendly and fair discussion of the matter. Clackamas County is one of the worst land monopoly ridden counties in Oregon, and its tax dodgers and land speculators are many. Some of them are classed as farmers. Some of them are in the Grange.

The farmer who is not more speculator than farmer will not care who tells him the truth nor where the missionary comes from, nor who pays him. Only the land speculator who has been a farmer is afraid of a tax that rests on land values only. The farmer who has thought on the matter knows that most of his capital and farm consists of improvements and personal-ity. He has nothing to fear from an increase on his land values of 50 per cent.

The State Tax Commission has a great hocus-pocus scheme for assessing rail-roads and franchises of public corpora-tions. Wasco county workers last year had some pretty stiff taxes to pay, and the taxes are a little stiffer this year. The railroad values, however, are cut over two and a third millions, and the entire assessed value of the county aside from franchises was less than nine and a quar-ter millions.

The so-called "scientific management" system is simply the old, old scheme of wearing out men faster and cheaper. It puts men on the "scrap pile" at forty, and it more frequently maims and cripples them. Men are cheap. We drive them out like stray dogs from Portland, and they are cheaper in the East where the "scientific" system is worked to the limit.

In convention assembled the workers of Oregon have emphatically condemned the measure that the last Legislature sub-mitted to the people giving every indiffer-ent and ignorant voter a vote of "no" on every measure on the ballot he ignores when in the voting booth.

The Socialists of Los Angeles discov-ered some time ago that machinery did not rest on moonshine, but on land. When they discover that thoroughly in Portland there will be a closer union between the forces of progress than there is now.

The workers of Oregon want the prin-ciples of the liability law put in the con-stitution where the Legislature cannot monkey with them.

Organized labor speaks for many thou-sands of the unorganized workers of Ore-gon who are in the thralls of wage slavery.
