NEW YORK MEN ALERT.

Executive Board Formulate Legislative Program on Labor Subjects.

New York.—The Executive Board of the New York State Federation of Labor met at Albany on December 13 and formulated a legislative program on a number of labor subjects of a very meritorious character. Among the many measures it decided to champion before the next legislature, the following are deserving of special mention: A Workmen's Compensation Act, modeled on the lines of the Compensation Act passed by the Legislature of Washington on March 14, 1911, which also includes a compulsory insurance provision—the Washington act was framed to meet the objections of the New York Supreme Court, in which it declared that the former New York Act took property without due process of law. The Washington act is considered by students to be the most comprehensive and complete, yet devised in the United States, for the purpose of compensating workmen suffering from industrial injuries. The Executive Board also decided to favor a bill creating a State-owned and operated printing office; an amendment to the Metal Polishing Law prohibiting females and minors to be so employed; an amendment to the State Eight-Hour Law, extending it to the manufacture of all building material; an amendment to the Conspiracy Law, so as to permit all lawful combinations; a bill prohibiting detective agencies from supplying employees where strikes or lock-outs are known to exist; an amendment to the Garnishee Law, raising the wage limit from \$12 to \$20 per week; a bill providing for sanitary conveniences in foundries; a bill prohibiting the employment of women in sausage making and other slaughter house by-products.

UNEMPLOYED IN MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston.—The Bureau of Statistics has just issued Labor Bulletin No. 85, and treats of unemployment in the organized industries and the labor supply and demand at the state free employment offices. For the quarter ending Sept. 30, complete returns were received from 78 per cent of the organizations representing approximately 70 per cent of the aggregate trade union membership, and 5.6 per cent were reported as unemployed. This percentage is lower by one point than the corresponding percentage (6.6) for the close of the preceding quarter. The condition of the labor market for the quarter showed a decided improvement over the same quarter last year. There was an increased demand for building tradesmen and metal workers, while the demand for general unskilled workers remained about the same as last year.

The assessors of the western counties of Washington are being called upon and are somewhat inclined to raise the assessment on the stump lands to make the speculative holders use them or let some one else use them. It is admitted the remedy would be effective.

There will be no annual conference in 1912 between representatives of the Stove Founders' National Defense Association and the International Molders' Union. The conference agreements and the percentage that was paid during 1911 will be in force until December 31, 1912.

REYNOLDS' VIEW OF IT.

London.—Reynolds' newspaper, one of the most substantial and accurate publications in England, has this to say anent the labor situation: "The new year has opened with a general unrest in the labor world, and the issues at stake are of national importance. Apart from a number of minor trade troubles there is the great lockout in the cotton trade. This involves the question of non-union labor. It seems outrageous that workers who do not share the cost of self-protection should

have the impudence to work side by side with those who levy themselves to maintain a living wage, control the hours of work and abolish sweating. Yet we find this state of things not only in the cotton industry, but also amongst miners and in other trades. Non-unionists gain all the advantages won by organized workers, yet it does not cost them a single penny. The trade unionist has, however, come to the conclusion that this is an impossible state of affairs. It must be stopped and the present struggle will clear the air."
