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BY LAWS, WORKING CARDS WE CARRY UNION WATER MARKED PAPER

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**LETTERHEADS** ENVELOPES-In Fact ANYTHING You Want A TAX MEASURE TO WIN.

A taxation measure that combines the principles of land value taxation and graduated land tax has been proposed and published by E. S. J. McAllister, W. S. U'Ren, W. G. Eggleston, George M. Orton, H. D. Wagnon and others. It is too long for publication in this issue of the Labor Press, but its provisions are in substance as follows:

Amending Article IX. Section 2a, it provides for a graduated and specific tax upon land values, franchises, water power and other natural resources "on, in and under land," beginning with all held over \$10,000 in value at \$2.50 per \$1.000. At \$20,000 another \$2.50 is added, making \$5 specific tax per thousand up to \$30,000. at which point another \$2.50 is added, and so on until on any one holding over \$100,-000 the tax is \$30 per \$1,000. This is in addition to the ordinary levy made by county, city, school or road district, etc.

Such funds collected by this tax go to pay the state levy, schools, roads and bridges, other county expenses, special purposes approved by the voters, in the order named.

Water power must be assessed separately from the land values; and improvements also.

The State Goard of Tax Commissioners is reduced to the Governor, Secretary of State and State Treasurer, with power to direct assessments and enforce the law.

Special provision is made to permit the people of any county to levy taxes upon improvements and personal property for local purposes by so voting at a special or general election; but otherwise they are not to be taxed.

Public corporations are closely defined as any corporation having a franchise or granted the right of eminent domain.

Forfeiture of the property is provided for if any fake sales, deeds or other subterfuges are attempted in order to evade the tax.

Of course the cry is raised against the measure of "Single Tax!" That is all the answer to it that can be made. Any law that honestly attempts to reduce taxation must be along the lines of exempting some form of labor values. Even the most rabid opponents of the single tax propose to exempt household furniture to the extent of \$500. This is in the same direction as exempting improvements and personal property, and there is no more reason or sense in exempting lumber sawed up into furniture than into houses, or iron in a sewing machine than in a mowing machine.

If a graduated land value tax is imposed as provided by the measure outlined above, then it may do something toward evening up the tally. If the Oregonian and other newspapers are going to yell "single tax!" like the dingdonging of a bell, at every measure to relieve the producers from taxation, then ts alarms will cease to excite dismay. Indications are that this measure has struck the right path to victory and will earry in every county in Oregon, even if the plundering classes yell "single tax" until their eyes bung out.

#### A GRAFTING SCHEME.

Present investigations shows that electricity can be and has been furnished in this city for three mills per kilowat hour. It is now being sold for seven-eighths of a cent to favored parties. Experts along independent lines show that it costs less than one mill to generate electricity when you have water power stolen from the people. There are facts going to show that from electricity generated from waste products of sawmills the cost is less than three mills. Then a corporation asks for a special franchise in this city with a minimum rate fixed at nine cents! Such a proposition would be an insult to the intelligence of a Hottentot village. It is evidently a grafting scheme to "pull the Main 340 A 4613 leg" of the present light and power monopoly, and should be cut off at the pockets | Chas. Kirchner. by throwing out the franchise asked for.
