THE PROBLEM OF POVERTY.

A. J. Pillsbury, in California Outlook:

Perhaps I harp on the problem of Poverty rather more than my readers enjoy. If so, it is because I see more of it than most of my readers do. Sometimes I wonder that the Great God can look down upon an earth where so much injustice and hard heartedness exists and not blot the whole thing out. He was a sunny son of the Norseland upon whose clean fine face, and into whose clear blue eyes, it was good to look. In a former generation he would have gone to work for some farmer, gotten a team together and a cow or two and gone out upon a claim to make a home, sending back to Norseland for the girl he left behind him. Ten years would have found him forehanded and a nest of young Norse-Americans growing up about his hearth. Now he has no hope of a home of his own and a family. I put the question to him and his answer was, "How can I? Two and a quarter a day during the busy season and the whole bunch of us laid off during four or five months in the year? Even when I get to be a full-fledged journeyman the pay is only \$3.25 per day and for not more than 200 days in the year and that going from place to place with no settled home anywhere. I would like to have a home as well as another man, but how can I?" Here was another: About thirty. American, unskilled laborer, but with a good, rugged face and intelligent mind. He had been working for \$2.25 per day at road making, out of which he paid his boss 75 cents a day for board, leaving \$1.50 per day net for the support of his family. I asked him if he had one. "No. How can I?" was his reply. "What kind of a man would it be that would ask a woman to share an income with him, to say nothing of children?" This man is a good worker and sure of a job if there is work in his line to be done and is fortunate above his fellows in that he is able to put in perhaps 250 days in the year. Is it the cost of high living, as Jim Hill would have us believe, that stands in the way of these men,—good, robust, virile men,—having families, or is it less than a living wage? About how high can a family live on \$9 per week? And what is to become of that country, whose toilers at unskilled labor (and division of labor is rapidly reducing most occupations to unskilled) are unable, through lack of earning power, to reproduce their kind? "They should have learned a trade." Certainly, but about what percentage of American boys can get a chance to learn a trade if they want to? Is it one in five? I doubt it.

I asked an employer for a great corporation if he could get all the unskilled help he wanted at \$2.20 per day, and his reply was, "Oh, yes; no trouble at all. Men standing around all the time waiting for a chance; good, big, brawny men, too." Do any of them have families? "Yes, quite a number of them do. Are you able to furnish such men work all through the year?" "Oh, no; only the best of them. They must be within call in the morning. We take as many as we need and let the rest go." How do such men and their families make out to live on such an income? "Well, you see, it is different with them than it is with us. They have their standards of living and we have ours. We would suffer torture to try to live by their standard and they would not know how to behave if they were to undertake to live by our standards."

With which the gentleman cranked his automobile and sped away, greatly satisfied with himself because he, by his hustle and drive, had developed an earning capacity that enabled him to live on the luxuries rather than upon the necessities of life, and yet I have seen the seed of such men begging bread. There are incapables and ne'er-do-wells who crowd the bottom rungs of the industrial ladder and if they prove unable to reproduce no matter, but when that comes to be true of men and women of good average capacity, as it has all over this country, and within thirty years, the reason why needs to be found and remedied. Equality of opportunity no longer exists. The stratifications of the old world are re-forming in the new world. Is there any way to prevent it? I am not sure that there is, but the least any lover of his race can do is to seek if perchance he may find a way. It is not enough that the exceptional man, shall wax rich and fortunate, and if the unfit fail to survive we can comfort ourselves with the thought that it is better so, but when good, honest mediocrity fails to reproduce because it cannot afford to all is not well with the world.
