BURLINGTON (VT.) MAKES GAINS.

Burlington, Vt.—The strike of the lumber mills of Burlington is now in the eighth week with an unbroken line of strikers. One of the largest companies has settled, signing an nine-hour agreement, but the other companies still remain intractable.

Charters have been issued to textile workers at Wineski, where the employees of the American Woolen company have decided to organize.

A local union has been formed among the cotton weavers of the Queen City Mills. The men, women and children employed in this latter mill work sixty-four hours per

week, with wages averaging \$6.50. In other mill towns in the vicinity organizations of the mill workers is only a matter of a short time.

LABOR CONDITIONS BAD.

Eureka, Cal.—Labor conditions in this county (Humboldt) are bad, due to lack of organization. The building trades in this city are fairly well organized. It is reported that the woodsmen only receive \$1.50 to \$2.00 per day of ten hours. Efforts are being continued by the American Federation of Labor to organize the migratory and unskilled labor in this section of the state.

Dear Sir and Brother:—Enclosed please find half tone print of the conditions existing in a union label collar and cuff factory. This condition exists only because our brothers have become negligent and have forgotten to ask for Bell Brand Union Made Collars and Cuffs.

We therefore urge you on behalf of the women employed in that factory to make some little sacrifice and buy union labeled collars and cuffs. Give them the support they deserve. If your dealer will not furnish them to you, then appoint one of your members to take orders and send directly to the Ide Brothers Company, Albany, N. Y., for them. Unless we are able to build up a better business we will lose this collar and cuff factory, and it will be a long time before we again have a factory to furnish us union made collars and cuffs.

Owing to the conditions that now prevail, all the members being laid off, we make this appeal and trust members of organized labor will not let it go unheeded. JUDGE ARCHBALD INDICTED.

Washington.—The judiciary committee of the House of Representatives, on July 8, submitted to the house its conclusions as the result of its investigations into the charges filed against Judge Robert W. Archbald, formerly district judge of the United States Court for the middle district of Pennsylvania, and now a judge of the commerce court. The judiciary committee is unanimous in its decision that the judge has prostituted his office for personal profit, and arraigns his conduct in a most denunciatory manner.

The several offenses charged against the judge are sustained by the committee and set forth in great particularity. According to law the Senate will now be called upon to formally conduct the impeachment proceedings. The legislative machinery whereby judges may be recalled by the people has been given a decided impetus by the revelations in the case against Judge Archbald.

ANTI-TRUST ACT DECISION.

Washington.—According to a decision just handed down by the Massachusetts supreme judicial tribunal the owners of patents are included as coming under the operation of the Sherman anti-trust law. The case in which this decision covers involved the United Shoe Machinery company, and the decision, written by Chief Justice Rugg, finds that, while the question of whether the United Shoe Machinery company is "an illegal combination in restraint of trade, and has monopolized trade and commerce between the several states," must be governed ultimately by decision of the United States Supreme Court, no word or phrase in the Sherman anti-trust act reveals an intent to exempt the owners of patents from its sweeping provisions against monopolistic combination.

If a majority of the delegates to the Central Labor Council are not present at an important meeting see that it is not the fault of your own local that the absentee majority was increased any.
