IN SEATTLE; WHY NOT PORTLAND?

Members of organized labor in Seattle are proud of their labor temple, not only because it is the first, but because with all the others following after there does not appear to be any so complete in detail as the Seattle Labor Temple. The Motor-man and Conductor has the following:

In connection with organizing Division No. 587, Seattle, Wash., G. E. B. Member Richard Cornelius, on behalf of the association, extends thanks to the Seattle Labor Temple Hall Association and the trades unionists of Seattle for the consistent and valuable assistance they rendered in establishing the new local. Hall conveniences were given gratis for the week.

In connection with extending his thanks, Brother Cornelius writes that some ten years ago, Manager Frank Rust, of the Labor Temple, who is also a lawyer and member of the Printers' Union, became possessed of an inspiration that a home for labor should be built in Seattle. Many other labor souls shared in the purpose and, as a result, in the year 1905, the home for trades unionists was ready to receive its family. Mr. Rust was selected as manager and has continued in that position ever since.

The building is three stories and basement and has halls of all dimensions suitable to accommodate the various unions and for the convenience of all requirements of the labor movement, and it stands a tribute to those who were active in its establishment.

For the convenience of its patrons the Seattle Labor Temple Association has:

A private switchboard connecting all offices and halls and a public station on each floor.

Fireproof safe with private lock drawers for tenants.

A first-class adding machine.

A first-class typewriter.

A first-class mimeograph.

A first-class system of caring for and delivering mail to the proper parties at the proper time.

Employs competent switchboard operators and office help for service from 7:30 a. m. to 10:30 p. m., who receive and deliver any and all kinds of messages for business agents during their absence.

There are thirteen private offices for rent to business agents, which includes offices of the association and business agent of the Central Labor Council.

Also eleven halls, with seating capacity varying from twenty to seven hundred.

A kitchen and banquet room, fully equipped with dishes, glass and silverware, and table linen.

Free reading and pool room.

Lawrence, July 19.—The July session of the superior criminal court authorized by last year's legislature, wound up after an eight-day session at Salem last Monday. Four days only were given to jury trials and juryman. The hot weather, with the thermometer up in the nineties, was given for the abrupt ending of the sitting. The Ettore-Giovanitti case was not reached, consequently it will have to go over until September.

This will mean considerable more delay. But even in September, there will be no assurance of an immediate trial. It is understood in well informed circles that some of the capitalist interests will endeavor to have the trial go over until after election because of the political issues involved. This means more delay and an additional injustice to both Ettore and Giovanitti, who have already been imprisoned since January. Only a continuance of the protest movement on a more spirited basis can prevent this latest crime against the two men.
