well lie in the striking fact, upon which sufficient stress has never been laid by anti-socialist writers, that Socialism has not grown up as a creed among the workers as the result of the observation, experience and thought, but has been imposed upon the workers by a set of comfortably fixed intellectuals who have never done any work themselves and have no first-hand knowledge of the working classes, such as can only be gained by working among workers as a co-worker. In support of this point it is only necessary to recall the leading names of Socialism—Marx, LaSalle, Leibknecht, Lafargue, Aveling, Engels, Bebel, Singer, Hindman, Belford, Bax, Kautsky, Hillquit, Stokes, Paterson and Wayland, a group of university students and rich men.

"Contract this with the parentage of trades unionism. The trades union movement originated with the workmen, was developed by them, and exists today as a living force in our industrial life only because millions of workers have given their adhesion to the movement and regard it as the right arm of their defense against unfair treatment.

"Now, the greatest enemy of trades unionism is Socialism, for while the former bases its action upon the theory that the interests of the employer and those of the worker are to a considerable extent reconcilable, the latter acts upon the assumption that these interests are absolutely opposed and irreconcilable. The trades unionist believes in peace, in industry, in conciliation, and in trade agreements, in arbitration, and in collective bargaining; the Socialist opposes these ideas and expedients, and for a most discreditable reason, namely, that the more employers and workers are brought together, the more disputes are settled by actual concession, the less it will be possible for the Socialists to preach successfully the doctrine of class hatred, upon which the fulfillment of their hopes depends."

KNOCKS OUT MINIMUM WAGE.

Contractors in Seattle are said to be taking Seattle's minimum wage law of \$2.75 per day into the courts. Spokane's \$3.00 minimum law was knocked out by the state supreme court and the Seattle contractors are hopeful that their case will be successful, building their hopes, of course, on the supreme court decision. This is shown the far-reaching effects of court decisions. No decision can be entirely local in scope as cases involving the same principles and the same points of law are constantly arising in various parts of the country. A Washington decision today becomes the law of precedent for a decision in the state of Maine tomorrow and precedent is meat and drink to the legal mind. It cannot be contended with reason or justice that \$3.00 or \$2.75 a day is an unreasonable wage for a city where the cost of living is on the top shelf. But because private contractors refused to pay that figure our learned supreme court has decided that it is unreasonable for a municipality to pay it and the echo will doubtless be heard wherever there is a minimum wage law.

ANTI-SUFFRAGE CONSISTENCY.

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COLLINS TALKS ON SOCIALISM.

That socialism is the greatest enemy of the trade union movement and that it generates class hatred is the contention of Peter W. Collins, formerly international secretary of the Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. The above views were expressed by Mr. Collins in an interview published in the New York World recently, part of which is as follows:

"You never heard the Socialist orator proclaiming the theory of Karl Marx that religion, private property and marriage stands in the way of Socialism, and that

the Socialist state can only be established when these three factions have been eliminated; and yet this is the cardinal principle of Socialism.

The proposal of the socialists to destroy everything in order to get rid of the unsatisfactory conditions which they love to dwell upon is precisely that of the man who, when he discovers a leak in one of the water pipes in his house, declares that he will burn down the house in order to get even with the leak.

"As a matter of fact socialism has never laid a brick in any constructive work. And the reason for this may very
