## Proceedings of the Central Labor Council

Official Minutes of the Last Meeting of the Working Head of Organized Labor for Portland and Vicinity.

Meeting called to order at 8:15, July 10, by President Stanley.  
On roll call all officers present except Jenkins.  
Minutes of previous meeting were approved as read.

**Credentials**—Ned Smith and Carl Weber, from International Longshoremen's Association No. 385; Carl Caulfield, O. Osborne and A. Edwards, from Electrical Workers No. 48; G. A. Rogers, J. E. Brown and M. E. Nolan, from International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Stablemen and Helpers No. 162; Ben Osborne and J. E. Fitzgibbons, from Bridge and Structural Iron Workers No. 29; Chas. C. Hoffman and Theo. Kruppenbacher, from National Union of United Brewery Workers of the United States, No. 320; John Emmett and Frank Riley, from Bridge and Dock and Pier Carpenters No. 872; Fred Buhler, L. A. Jenkins, Jack Campbell and A. Bonham, from Carpenters No. 50.

**Report of Committees**—Executive Committee reported as follows: The matter of the Circle Theatre was taken up. Mr. Winstock of the Exhibitors' League was present, accompanying the manager and proprietor of the theatre in question. After a discussion of some length it was agreed that representatives from the Theatrical Federation and from the Exhibitors' League should meet in conference and try to adjust the matter. Hence the Board recommends that secretary be instructed to communicate with the above organizations asking each to join in this conference. Signed: Mrs. Gee, Smith, Hayes, Ockwig, Forte.  
Recommendation of committee was concurred in.

**Legislative Committee**—No business before committee.  
On motion, seconded and carried, Father E. O'Hara and Dr. O'Hara were given the floor of the Council.

Both gentlemen spoke on the unemployment question and requested the Council to appoint a committee of five to act as an advisory committee with other organizations and discuss the problem of unemployment. The request of the speakers was complied with and the following committee, including the chairman, was appointed: Eugene Smith, Wm. Mackenzie, A. H. Harris, G. A. Rogers, and M. W. Petersen.

Delegate Caulfield reported that on next Thursday the case of the Willamette Iron Works will come up for trial for violation of the eight-hour law.

Conductor—C. G. Ockwig. Warden—Henry Harder. Trustees—R. O. Rector, W. G. Todd, Mrs. L. Gee and G. S. Warner. Executive Committee—Mrs. L. Gee, M. E. Nolan, C. H. Kelley. Organized Committee—Everett Logan, J. E. Brown. Legislative Committee—C. G. Ockwig, E. E. Southard. Further nominations at next meeting.

On motion, seconded and carried, Executive Committee was instructed to bring in recommendation concerning the work of the secretary, and report back at next meeting.

**New Business**—From Building Trades Council, concerning labor day celebration. Moved and seconded that a committee of 20 be appointed as labor day committee to make preparations for labor day celebration. Amended that committee of five be appointed. Amendment to amendment that Council celebrate labor day and proceeds to go to the Labor Temple Association. Amendment to amendment carried. Moved and seconded that committee of five be appointed to handle the labor day celebration. Carried. Chair appoints das committee: Ben Osborne, Eugene Smith, Henry Harder, Glenn Harris, M. W. Petersen.

On motion of Delegate Harder, Meves Restaurant was removed from the unfair list of Council.

Delegate Osborne reported that the Lents Theatre controversy had been adjusted satisfactorily to the Building Trades Council.
