Proceedings of the Central Labor Council

Official Minutes of the Last Meeting of the Working Head of Organized Labor for Portland and Vicinity.

February 19, 1915. Council called to order by President Smith at 8 P. M. In the absence of Secretary Stack, A. W. Jones was appointed temporary secretary.

Minutes of the previous meeting was read and approved after correction to read that the executive committee had reported a settlement of the Timber Workers' strike.

Credentials—Credentials were received from the International Brotherhood of Steam Shovel and Dredge Men for A. J. Quigley and R. E. Wills; this union to take the place of Steam Shovel Men No. 12. From Multnomah Typographical Union for W. F. Otto, to replace E. Southard, resigned. From Metal Trades Council for Mr. Miller, as member of legislative committee for ensuring term. From Carpenters' Local No. 50 for G. W. Stanley, A. Bonham and J. L. Ledwidge. From Brewery Workers No. 320 for Michael Kleiner, in place of T. Kruppenbacher, resigned. From Photo-Engravers for L. Egbert, in place of G. Handley. From Bill Posters No. 57 for Gus Jenkins. From Metal Trades Council for F. B. Raebig, as delegate on Board of Control of Labor Press, and for Mr. Trimble on Executive Board of Council.

From Musicians for T. H. Burchard and H. G. Surlis. Communications—From I. L. A. No. 38-6 re amendments, referred to secretary for tabulation. From Carhart Co., filed. From Musicians' Union requesting that all dances for which a charge is made at which non-union musicians are employed be placed on unfair list and authority to use the name of Council in bantering same, request granted. From Sheet Metal Workers No. 16 containing vote on amendments, referred to secretary for tabulation. From Moving Picture Operators, to secretary for tabulation. From Stage Employees, to secretary for tabulation. From Carpenters No. 50, to secretary for tabulation. From Senator Chamberlain re House Bill No. 17894, filed. From Department of Public Utilities, referred to legislative committee. From Metal Trades Council, referred to Executive Board with instructions to concur. From Progressive Business Men's Club, filed. From Building Trades Council, referred to Executive Board with power to act. From Oklahoma Trades Council, for publication in Labor Press. From

Garment Workers, secretary will secure data and enter protest. Bills—The bill of P. A. Nordstrom for \$18 was allowed. Reports of Sections—All sections report business quiet. Standing Committees—Executive committee reported conditions in the settlement of the Timber Workers' strike while not all that could be desired, they are satisfied that settlement is best that could be made at this time. Also reported having settled the trouble with the Mathison Bar, but were unable to do anything with the Paul Pick Saloon and recommended that it be placed on unfair list.

Special Committees—Lipman-Wolfe boycott committee asked one week's further time. Request granted. Also urged all members of Council to attend City Council meeting when Daily ordinance comes up. At this time a motion was made and passed to suspend the regular order of business and hear ex-Mayor Shank, of Indianapolis, who was the guest of the evening. At the conclusion of Mayor Shank's remarks the gentleman was tendered a vote of thanks.

New Business—Under this head the Labor Press was instructed to publish a notice to the effect that no person has been named or has authority to represent the Timber Workers as business agent. A committee of two, Brothers M. W. Peterson and C. G. Ockwig, were appointed to attend the mass meeting re the matter of sailors who were detained against their will on Norwegian ship.

Good and Welfare—Delegate Mrs. Gee gave a rousing talk on patronage of labels, which was enthusiastically received. The resignation of Mrs. Gee as member of trustees was regretfully accepted. Financial Report.

END UNFAIR COMPETITION.

The Musicians' Union, of Jacksonville, Ill., has been successful in its protest against the employment of boys from the Illinois School for the Blind as musicians in competition with the regular musicians who depend upon their calling for a livelihood and the support of their families. President John H. Walker, of the State Federation of Labor, took the matter up with the state board of administration and succeeded in securing a satisfactory adjustment of the matter. The board has issued instructions to the managing officer of the school to discontinue the practice of allowing the boys from the institution to go out and play music in competition with the musicians of Jacksonville.

MORE REST FOR WORKERS.

The Massachusetts State Federation of Labor will attempt to amend the one day's rest in seven law, which excludes from its provisions employes of gas and electric manu-

facturers, drug stores, livery stables, garages and other public or semi-public servants, including employes of hotels and restaurants. The unions have filed a bill which would annul the exemption of hotel and restaurant employes. Other bills include public school text books of Massachusetts made for the children of this state; but five hours of labor a day for children under sixteen and the transfer of the supervision over employment agencies to the state board of labor and industries.

"PHOSSY JAW" OUTLAWED.

'Phossy jaw,' the occupational matchworkers' disease, has been outlawed now in every part of America, due primarily to the efforts of the American Federation of Labor in championing the Esch bill, which passed the Sixty-second Congress. Shortly after Mexico issued an administrative order against it; and recently the Canadian Parliament wiped the continent clean.
