

TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION

Nothing of interest has developed during the past week in the printing business. Most job shops are merely marking time, while the newspapers continue to be just a little improved in the way of work.

M. D. Farmer of the Journal chapel returned last week from an eastern and California trip, reporting a splendid time. He visited the Printers' Home at Colorado Springs on the return trip and was much impressed with its appearance.

The Telegram has just installed a new model B Intertype, and will put in another soon, replacing two old linotypes which were purchased in San Francisco when the plant was installed. C. C. Clinton, Intertype agent, is supervising the installation.

Hugo Hollman of the A. E. Kern chapel has been sick for about ten days, but is able to be about again.

M. E. Rotsaert, who has been laid up for several weeks, the result of a bad fall from the porch of his home on Portland Heights, returned to work in the Oregonian composing room last week.

In the Salt Lake City election of November 2, Henry K. Russell was beaten for City Commissioner by Karl A. Scheid, capitalist, by 246 votes out of 25,400 cast. Mr. Russell is an operator in the composing room of the Salt Lake Evening Telegram, was for several years secretary of the Utah State Federation of Labor and is active in his own union. For a short time in 1910 Mr. Russell was in Portland and worked on the Oregonian.

J. W. Barrett deposited a Walla Walla traveling card last week. He has been in Idaho and Eastern Washington and Oregon, having worked in Baker in August and September.

A record attendance of the Typographical union was held in Moose hall last Sunday, there being 210 members present, and a lively session was the result. Among the members were William A. Marshall, of the State Industrial Accident Commission, who spoke of the work of his commission, and William H. Daly, City Commissioner, who also spoke. Mr. Daly was in a reminiscent mood, and spoke of old times among the printers and mentioned the fact, well known to members of 25 or 30 years' standing, that chairman of chapel was called "father" of the chapel. Mr. Daly has been a member of the organization for more than 30 years.

The mention made by W. H. Daly last union meeting of the fact that in earlier days of the union chairmen were called "fathers" of chapels brought to an old-timer now in Portland memories of chapels years ago. "With the introduction of printing in the British Isles," said the old-timer, "came printers from Belgium, and with them customs of that period—among them the chapel, partly religious, partly fraternal. The first several printers' unions of the United States were formed by a federation of chapels. In boyhood I worked on the Sacramento Daily Union. There was then no typographical union in Sacramento, but the Union office had a chapel, for a long time presided over by Charley Harrison, a union printer from the State of Virginia. Chapel meetings were conducted in a semi-religious manner. Union traveling cards or other evidence of good faith were deposited with the father of the chapel, who collected dues, to some extent aided indigent wanderers, and the chapel with solemnity buried its dead. This chapel had a fund of several thousand dollars, a well-kept plot in the city cemetery, and the first printer I ever saw buried was there—John Henry Russell, a Scotchman '49er."

J. W. Anderson, formerly of Bailey & Sons' chapel, who has been suffering from lead-poisoning for several years, has been granted admission to the Union Printers' Home at Colorado Springs and left for that institution Wednesday night.

W. C. Duniway of the Oregonian chapel, who has been laid up several months with eye trouble, a portion of the time being unable to leave home without help, is now able to get around again, and is hopeful that his vision will soon be fully restored.

A. C. Raven, who has been living the simple life near McMinnville during the past year, has purchased a place in Portland on the Mount Scott line near Firland station, and has moved their effects from McMinnville.

Bert Morden and "Buck" Harbo of the Oregonian have gone to the San Francisco Fair via lumber schooner from St. Helens, and will be absent about two weeks. We have it on good authority that economy did not enter into their choice of routes.

The outer office of the Typographical union will be opened at 8 every morning during the winter, to allow those who desire to come to the office after showing up in the morning. Secretary's hours will be as usual, 9 to 1, and 2 to 5:30.
