

ALBERT B. CUMMINS STANDS FOR RIGHTS OF COMMON PEOPLE

Mr. Cummins has been a member in good standing of the Carpenters' Union for more than 25 years and in appreciation of his record as a union man and his services to the common people since he has been in public office the Iowa State Federation of Labor has unqualifiedly endorsed his candidacy.

Probably no man in public life, since the days of Abraham Lincoln, stands as high in the estimation of the common folks at the present time as does Albert B. Cummins, of Iowa.

The reason is not hard to find when one considers that he has always been the consistent champion of the rights of those who had not the power to assert their rights.

Neither does his hold upon their affections seem strange when, after a long and honorable career as a lawyer, a member of the Iowa Legislature, thence elected Governor of the state for seven years and then receiving the crowning honor of twice being elected to the United States Senate, his head has not been turned so far that he cannot see the struggles of the millions in the lower walks of life, nor his heart so encompassed with the pride of official position that it no longer responds in sympathy to their needs nor thrills at the joy of battling for their rights.

He remains the same, straightforward, plain man of the people—the ideal American. Political honors have not spoiled him—they have broadened him. Constant striving for the maintenance of the immortal principles of truth and equity have made him unafraid. He dare anything to uphold the right, or tear down the wrong. And his record shows it, appended hereto:

What He Accomplished in Iowa.

One of the best primary election laws. Election of U. S. Senators by popular vote.

Put the free pass and lobby out of business. Business methods in all departments of state.

Equalized the burdens of taxation. Iowa's first child-labor legislation. Refused to permit Iowa to harbor railroad mergers.

Compulsory attendance at school. Publicity for campaign contributions. Wrote one of the first and best railroad laws.

Limitation of hours of labor for railroad men. Reduced passenger fares for Iowa. Over-capitalization of corporations prevented.

Protection for all insurance policy holders. Interest on the people's money on deposit. Re-organized system of higher education.

Practically rebuilt colleges and other institutions. Factory inspection and safety appliance legislation.

Pure food, pure seed, and no butter frauds. Cummins' Career in the U. S. Senate.

Kept the postal savings funds at home. Materially helped secure direct election of Senators.

Favored an equitable income tax bill. Voted for free tolls through Panama Canal.

Prevented legalized railroads pools and mergers. Long favored commission for business treatment of tariff.

Made carriers responsible for livestock losses. Made fight for Presidential preference laws.

Made it possible to have uniform classification of freight. Forced more equitable distribution of national delegates.

Able championed genuine protection to industries.

Fought effectively against seating of Lormer.

Placed true history of soldiers on the Iowa battle monuments.

Exposed the inequalities of Canadian reciprocity agreement.

Voted for Federal commission on workmen's compensation.

Author of Federal boiler inspection law.

Supported bill for Federal children's bureau.

Wrote into law that "the labor of a human being is not a commodity or article of commerce."

Won a great lawsuit which broke the barbed wire monopoly and saved millions to American farmers.

Compelled more equitable distribution of funds for education.

He has ever stood for the rights of the individual man, for competition as against monopoly, for political freedom and equality, against discriminations and special favors and for a liberal construction of the constitution.

Views Upon Corporate Rights.

The following extract from his first inaugural address as Governor of Iowa gives a keen insight to his convictions on the fundamental rights and limitations of corporate interests:

"There is another thought which is directed more to the creation of a wholesome sentiment than to the enactment of laws, to which I must draw your attention. He who honestly makes, has the right to safely keep, whether it be one dollar or a million dollars, yet there are certain incidents of wealth, and especially associated wealth, which ought to receive the serious consideration of those who have the welfare of their country at heart. Wealth gives to him who owns or controls it power for great good and for great evil; it gives him power to endow schools, found libraries, and relieve want, but it also gives him power to seduce and coerce his fellow men, and his power should be most jealously scrutinized. Wealth and especially incorporated wealth, has many rights; but it should always be remembered that among them is not the right to vote. Corporations have, and ought to have, many privileges; but among them is not the privilege to sit in political conventions or occupy seats in legislative chambers. Corporations, as such, should be rigorously excluded in every form from participation in political affairs. Here at least the rich and the poor, as individuals, should meet upon a plane of absolute equality. The conscience and intelligence of the natural man must be the sole factors in determining what our laws shall be and who shall execute them."

Interesting Sidelights of the Man and His Methods.

When Cummins undertook defense of the independent makers of barbed wire he donned a blouse and worked in a factory until he had learned the details of every machine, then went into court and won a victory over a giant monopoly.

The great career of this remarkable man could be well summed up in the brief philosophy of Herbert Kaufman: "Your due is measured by what you do. You can't fail if you don't quail." Albert B. Cummins never quailed.
