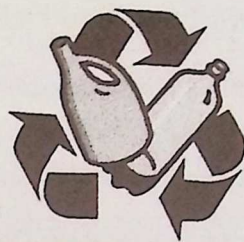


OREGON YOUTH SUMMIT

Jaime Escalante, the inspiration for the 1988 film, *'Stand and Deliver'*, will be the featured speaker at the upcoming Youth Summit, *"Keeping the Promise to Youth."* The summit is sponsored by the Lions Clubs of Oregon and will take place on October 9-10 in Wilsonville. The summit is an outgrowth of General Colin Powell's Presidents' summit, "America's Promise: The Alliance for Youth", held in Philadelphia last year.

Governor John Kitzhaber and Dr. Jane Goodall are also scheduled to speak. The Summit will be built around five resources critical to help youth at risk: an ongoing relationship with a caring adult; safe places and structured activities in non-school hours; a healthy start for a healthy future; marketable career skills through effective education; and an opportunity to give back through service.
