

Asbestos Management in Butte Falls Schools

The Butte Falls School District has completed the initial phase of the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) by having all facilities inspected for friable and non-friable asbestos-containing materials and having an Asbestos Management Plan developed. Asbestos-containing materials have been identified in this school district.

The District is implementing Response Actions which include repair and removal of materials which have the highest degree of potential disturbance. The asbestos management program will be an on-going effort and each response action will be documented in the Management Plan. Reinspection of the asbestos-containing materials will happen every 6 months to assure the materials remain in a safe condition.

Management Plans are available for review in each building's office. Questions about the Asbestos Management Program should be directed to Bruce Pingle, Maintenance Director, Butte Falls School District.

New State Laws Govern Medicine at School

Recent changes in Oregon law prompted the Butte Falls School District Board of Directors to adopt a new policy governing the administering of non-injectable medicines to students. This new policy covers not only prescription and non-prescription medication, but also such items as aspirin, Tylenol, poison oak medications, and any other ointments and sprays. Per Board Policy JHCD-AR, Administering Non-injectable Medicines to Students, requests for designated staff (office manager only) to administer medication to students may be approved by the district under certain specific conditions. These conditions and requirements are described in detail in the student handbooks. If you have any questions you should contact the elementary or high school office manager.
