



Why Attendance Matters

- Often, parents don't realize that every day matters—even at the kindergarten and first grade levels.
- Attendance patterns and morning routines are set in September.
- In Oregon, students are considered chronically absent when they miss 10% of the school year, or 18 days.
- 1 in 6 Oregon children is chronically absent.
- This lost instructional time exacerbates dropout rates and achievement gaps.
- This significantly compromises a child's ability to read at grade level by the end of third grade.
- Children who are not reading at grade level by the end of third grade are less likely to graduate on time.
- Absenteeism can indicate a larger issue such as difficulty with transportation, housing, or emotional or physical challenges.
- Communities are committed to caring for their children, and resources are in place. Schools can connect students to solutions.
- When the root cause for absenteeism is addressed, attendance improves.
- When students reduce absences, they can make academic gains.
- When students make academic gains, they are more likely to graduate from high school on time.
