This included stocking new mountain lakes and the construction of Taylor Lake to create convenient fishing access to The Dalles, Ore.

Jim married Linda B. Newton on Aug. 16, 1969, in La Grande, Ore. They lived in Klamath Falls, Portland, and Pine Hollow, Ore., but spent most of their married life living in The Dalles. Jim loved to hunt and golf, but his favorite pastime was fishing on the Deschutes. 


