LARGE FORCE ON ELECTION BOARDS.

Last Friday the county court finished the selection of judges and clerks of election. Monday they had selected for all precincts outside of Eugene and Springfield, making a list of over 400 names for 63 precincts.

For the Eugene and Springfield precincts two boards were appointed. In this way it was expected to be able to handle the election returns with more speed and satisfaction.

There are 24 precincts in Eugene and Springfield, necessitating a force of nearly 300 judges and clerks.

The county courts states that they will remove the name of any person who does not desire to serve. February 11 is the last day which such protest may be filed.
