## BARGE FREDERICK IS ON THE DRY DOCK

Portland, Or., Feb. 13.—Repairs to the barge Frederick, belonging to the Tide Water Mill Company, of this city, and badly damaged by running ashore near the entrance to Yaquina Bay, will be made by Anderson & Crowe to whom the contract was let. The work of putting the sea-going barge in good condition is being started at the Oregon drydock. The contract is expected to be completed in twelve or fifteen days.

The Frederick is to be equipped with a new keelson, and a big portion of the bottom of the hull aft will be renewed. She is to be recalced and considerable other work will be done to her. Temporary repairs were made down the coast to permit of her being brought to Portland. Within three or four days, the tug Roscoe, owned by the same company, will come up from Florence for a general overhauling. It is announced she will tow the Frederick back to Florence, where the company owns a large sawmill plant.

## HAS RECEIVED REPLY FROM COUNTY JUDGE

A letter in answer to the resolutions of the Acme-Mapleton wagon road was received last week by the secretary of the mass meeting. It reads as follows:

Feb. 9th, 1914.

Mr. R. C. Wygant,  
Florence, Oregon.

Dear Sir:

I have received your letter of February 4th, enclosing the petition and resolutions passed by the Florence meeting in regard to opening a wagon road between Mapleton and Florence. I will present this matter to the Court this morning. (Feb. 9th.)

I had supposed that all along the people of your vicinity understood that the Court desired to get as full an expression as possible of what the people of your vicinity wanted.

The proposition to take the cash for the road has not been decided upon by the Court, and we have received no money from the railroad company on that account.

I write you this because I am told that some people claim that the County Court has received \$75,000.00 from the rail road company and expended it in other parts of the county.

Please let me know if the people who signed the resolution which you sent are all the people who were at the meeting, and if they are not all, please let me know about how many were at the meeting, and whether there was any opposition to the resolution, about how many voted for the resolution, and if any voted against it, about how many there were.

Please let me know if there is any difference of opinion at Florence in regard to this matter.
