TWO BUSINESS BUILDINGS PLANNED

Two more business buildings that have been planned by property owners in Florence are to be constructed this spring. Wm. Brynd who owns a corner lot on Front and Adams street has his plans nearly completed for the erection of a building with a frontage of 87 feet on Front street and covering his property. It will be a two-story structure and be a wooden building.

Mr. Brynd who owns considerable business property in our town, has always been ready to improve it and put buildings when it became necessary for and larger quarters on account of the growing business of Florence.

The lower part of the building will be made into 4 business rooms, while the upper story will have a hall 60x80 feet, with several ante rooms, and the balance will be used as office or living rooms.

Mr. Brynd has not decided definitely when he will start the construction but plans to begin the work soon.

The other building is in the block below and will be put up by Geo. T. Schroeder, on the lot where he now has a residence and the one just east, which he recently bought. This building as planned will have two business rooms on the first floor and the second floor will probably be made into a rooming house with about 22 furnished rooms.

Amity people voted down a city waterworks proposition recently but the matter is to be brought up in a more practical way.

Central Point is considering a water system with a pump system forcing 400 gallons per minute through the mains.

The Blue Rocks exhibited by Geo. Montgomery of Acme are something new and very handsome. He has originated this strain and claims they are fine layers. One hen began laying when it was five and one-half months old and has continued to lay except when moulting. He has nearly 31 of these chickens now and says the hens never set.

Another interesting exhibit were those fuzzy hens, called alaskan chickens. They were exhibited by J. Sanders of Mapleton.

At 1:30 Saturday afternoon a permanent Siuslaw Poultry association was formed and the following officers elected.

day afternoon, but most of them were not taken away until evening.

All who attended this poultry show were pleased with the class and number of exhibits and many compliments were given those who had been instrumental in its success.

TEACHERS OF WESTERN LANE ORGANIZE

The teachers of supervisory district No 5 met in Mapleton last Friday afternoon and evening. In the afternoon they gathered at the school house and enjoyed an informal programme as follows:

Violin Solo—Rev. Walter Wall.

Discussion—New Industrial clubs, as proposed by Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill, with a view of systematizing the school department of state and county fairs—C. L. Weaver.

In Supervisory District No. 5, there are now three industrial clubs, organized at Mapleton, Glenada and Florence. Four other schools are expecting to organize soon. Great interest is being taken in this feature by the pupils and teachers in this supervisory district, and it is expected to secure some very creditable results through these clubs.

Discussion—Picture Study—Miss Viola D. Jones.

Discussion—A Laboratory in a Chalk Box—Miss Francis McFarland.

This discussion took the nature of a demonstration and was very interesting and instructive. It proved that experimental agriculture in rural or town schools was both profitable and feasible.

The remainder of the afternoon was devoted to organizing a Siuslaw Teachers Association, which was effected with the following officers elected.

President, Vera T. Todd, principal of the Mapleton school; Vice President, C. L. Weaver, principal of Glenada schools; Secretary, Miss Francis McFarland, principal of Acme school.

The executive and program committee is composed of the president, district supervisor, and teacher of the school where the association meets. The association will have five meetings in one year, the first meeting to be at the annual teachers institute.

Any teacher holding a certificate and residing in this supervisory district is eligible to membership. The next meeting will be held at Acme, at which time the details of the association will be completed.

In the evening a Patron-teachers meeting was held at the school. The primary and intermediate grades of the Mapleton school giving a very entertaining program. A feature of the evening was a debate by High school students. The question was "Government Ownership of Railroads." Paul Robinson and Beulah Kibbler supported the affirmative, while Lulu Beers and Anna Meadows took the negative side of the question. The decision was given to the negative.

A discussion on the effect of county division on the schools, was led by Joe Slemmons and Chas. Fraer, and was offered as an open question. It proved a very interesting subject and many took part in the discussion.

The people of Mapleton showed an especial good spirit toward these meetings and took great interest in the matter.
