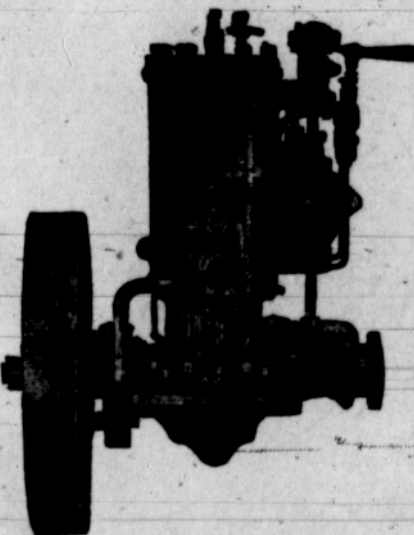

COOS BAY COAL TO REPLACE WOOD

Coos Bay coal will reduce the cost of heating in the Willamette valley, it will make steam power cheaper for factories. Coos Bay coal will displace wood as a fuel in the Willamette valley immediately upon the completion of rail connection between Eugene and Marshfield. Such is the declaration of Chester Washburn, one of the United States government oil and fuel experts who returned yesterday from a trip to the Coos Bay region.

Washburn returned to his home in Eugene recently after a four years' investigation of oil resources in South America. While here he completed a report to the United States government upon the oil resources of Oregon, which work was commenced five years ago, and which will be made public by the government later. He leaves tonight for Africa. He does not know to which part he must go. He will receive his instructions when he reaches the East and will scan that continent for oil.

Washburn was pleased with his visit to Coos Bay, which was part of an official investigation. And it is his belief that the chief markets of the large coal beds in that region, the second or third largest on the coast, will be the Willamette valley.

At present competition of oil, which has been adopted by the railroads and steamships, has practically eliminated the San Francisco market for coal, he states. The coal mines are producing very little coal at present.

"The people of Coos Bay can expect to look to Eugene and the Willamette valley for its market for this coal, just as soon as this railroad is completed," stated Mr. Washburn today. "And with the opening of the railroad it can be shipped in here for use as fuel, both for heating and for the production of power, cheaper than wood can now be sold. It will replace wood in the Willamette valley, in my belief, within a comparatively few months after it can be brought here by the railroad. The existence of the Willamette valley as a market will make possible the extensive operation of the Coos Bay coal fields."

Mr. Washburn states that the Coos Bay coal, a black lignite, or sub-bituminous, makes a good domestic fuel. It burns readily and clearly, leaving little ash.

WESTERN LANE'S SCHOOLS MODERN SAYS DR. HODGE

Enthusiastic over the resources of the western half of Lane county, and particularly impressed by the results accomplished by Goldie Van Bibber, Lane county's girl supervisor, Clifton Freemont Hodge, instructor in biology at the University, returned yesterday from a week's trip into the Siuslaw. He delivered lectures at Indian Creek, Mapleton, River-view, Acme, Portage, Florence, The Lake and at Glenada and spoke to a total of 650 persons. The largest audience was at Florence where 350 attended.

He spoke largely on health problems, and in the interest of the Oregon birds. In some instances he found the people interested in anti-fly problems, but these concerned the cattle flies, and methods of their riddance.

"Miss Van Bibber has done wonders," he exclaimed "It is a privilege to see the results of her work and the way in which people have been won by her toward modern education.

Everywhere I found fine school houses and fine schools. That girl has worked a revolution in that district. Everybody I talked with are enthusiastic supporters of their school system. Manual training, domestic science, and everything that is modern in education seems to have been introduced in these schools."

Professor Hodge left this afternoon for Salem, where he has been asked to launch an anti-fly campaign—Eugene Guard.
