RECREATION MANUAL FOR RURAL SCHOOLS

A practical recreation manual for the schools of the state has been received by E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools, and copies will be sent at once to the teachers of the grade schools of the county. The manual has just been published by J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction for Oregon.

Working in co-operation with the field secretary of the Playground and Recreation Association of America, the manual touches upon the methods of play for children of the public schools; it furnishes the teachers a systematic means for directing the play of the young people. By grades are listed the games and directions for playing.

In the preface the following paragraph illustrates the use of the book. "The value of play as an integral part of an educational system is beginning to receive some measure of the recognition that it had not had since Greek civilization was at its height. Theoretically we all accept the Greek ideal of an educational system that shall concern itself equally with the physical, mental and moral welfare of the individual. Practically, in this country, we have ignored the physical, given less and less attention yearly to the moral, and concentrated on the mental."

According to grades lists of games are outlined. The boys have their separate from those of the girls. For them are various strength tests and the more strenuous games. These have been carefully prepared to suit the age of the pupils. By means of illustrations playground work is to be taught and though the teacher may know nothing on the subject she will, by means of the manual, be able to pick up enough knowledge to consistently turn it to good purpose among the pupils.

The strength tests among the boys are outlined. The boys have their certain lists containing tests which once successfully completed will entitle the boy to a badge awarded by the Playground and Recreation Association of America. For the first test a boy must chin himself four times, do the standing broad jump of five feet nine inches, and a 60-yard dash in eight and three-fifths seconds. The tests, of which there are three, are then increased to chinning a bar nine times, the running high jump of four feet four inches, and the 220-yard dash in 28 seconds.—Register.

LOCATION FEDERAL RESERVE BANKS

After three months of consideration the reserve bank organization committee have announced that it has divided the continental United States into 12 banking districts and selected 12 cities where federal reserve banks are to be located under the new currency law. This was the first decisive step towards the establishment of the new system.

District No. 1—Boston.
District No. 2—New York.
District No. 3—Philadelphia.
District No. 4—Cleveland.
District No. 5—Richmond, Va.

District No. 6—Atlanta, Ga.
District No. 7—Chicago.
District No. 8—St. Louis.
District No. 9—Minneapolis.
District No. 10—Kansas City.
District No. 11—Dallas, Texas.
District No. 12—San Francisco.

The only reserve bank assigned to the Pacific coast is at San Francisco. It will serve six states and part of another, and will include 514 National banks. The population of this district, which is designated as the twelfth, is 5,389,303. It covers 603,658 square miles. The reserve bank's capital will be \$8,115,524. The states included are California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada, Utah and part of Arizona.

The organization committee was not authorized by law to provide for branch banks of the Federal reserve bank, but the act states that such banks shall be established. This task will be left to the supervision of the Federal reserve board yet to be appointed by President Wilson.
