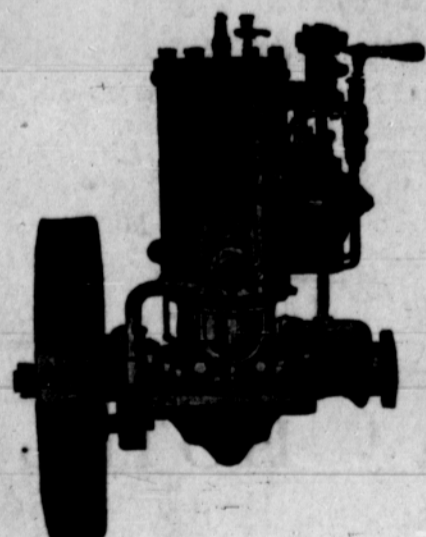

present season, Mr. Rader suggests that it is best to apply the lime on the top of the plowed land and then to disc it under well, and to seed during the next ten days.

Many of the farmers of Lane county are using "land plaster" or gypsum for the purpose of making "sour" land "sweet." This states Mr. Rader, is impossible to do with gypsum for it is a neutral salt; it possesses no alkaline and therefore has no connection with removing the acidity of the soil. However it does promote the growth of legumes by liberating the potash in the soil.

Should the lime deposits near Roseburg prove what they are said to be the lime will then be mined in carload lots, shipped to Eugene and distributed from here direct to the farmer, ready to apply to his land.—Morning Register.

## LIME AS A FERTILIZER

Crushed limestone, plowed under the sour soils of Lane county to relieve them of their acidity and prepare the way for the successful growing of clover on lands hitherto unproductive, is a plan announced yesterday by Floyd W. Rader, Lane county agriculturist. Already two tons of lime have been distributed among farmers of various sections for demonstration purposes. An effort will be made to enlist as many as possible in the movement.

Due to the present cost of the lime, which is \$11 a ton laid down in Eugene, Mr. Rader is now corresponding in regard to a limestone quarry 12 miles south of Roseburg, where it is hoped enough lime may be extracted at \$5 a ton to supply every farmer of Lane county and to make it an investment well worth the expenditure. Having watched the working of lime in this respect in various soils before coming to Eugene, Mr. Rader is confident that the plan, if properly worked out in this country, will be successful.

Asked the present condition of the soils and the need of lime for its treatment, the agriculturist said: "I have found much land that is 'sour,' is full of acid, and therefore is a poor producer. Some of this soil is clay, some of it is sand; some of it is in river bottoms and some of it is situated in the hills where the red clay has proven a problem to the farmer." Lime applied to acid clay land tends to make the soil mellow, to open it up, and to allow the proper capillary action of the water and a free circulation of air. This relieves any chance of acidity. Where sandy fields exist the treatment of lime, according to Mr. Rader, will cement the particles together and make a closer compact soil capable of holding water and moisture. Following this chemical action on the soil the bacteria of the clover or any crop will have a chance to live, while in the acid condition of the land they have been crowded out.

Samples of soil are now being collected from farms over the county and these are to be sent to Oregon Agricultural college for analysis. Having secured this, the farmer will best know how to treat his fields. Also a record will be kept of every farmer now enlisted in the demonstration work and next fall these facts are to be published in bulletin form for future reference. One farmer living between Junction city and Irving secured a ton of the lime; another farmer at Irving troubled with "white land" received one-fourth ton of lime for his land; still another at Goshen has half an acre already spread over with lime. In this way an effort has been made to spread the first of the lime as far apart as possible and in as extreme conditions as possible.
