It was supposed that the pup was to be a political mascot, but he proved to be a nuisance in the garden that the Captain was making so he died. CASH MONEY ORDERS AT ANY POSTOFFICE
Postmaster J. L. Page has received word from the department at Washington, D. C., that on and after July 1 of this year a money order may be cashed at any postoffice in the United States on or before 30 days after the date of its issuance. The act under which this ruling is made was approved by congress February 5, 1914, and will go into effect on July 1.
This will be much more convenient for the public than at present. Now and for the past many years money orders are and have been payable only at the office upon which they are drawn, but under this new ruling no matter upon what office they are drawn they may be cashed in any town where there is a postoffice, providing they are presented within 30 days after they were purchased. For instance, if someone sends you a money order from San Francisco, California, while you are in Eugene and you leave the city before the letter gets here and go to Minneapolis, Minnesota, and the letter follows you, you may cash the order at Minneapolis instead of being compelled to wait till you return to Eugene and cash it at the office upon which it was drawn.
While this will be a great convenience to the public, it will mean more work for the postmaster and his assistants. They will have to keep a complete record of all orders on other places cashed here and notify the other offices and keep account of the cash paid out for each office.—Morning Register.


ORDINANCE NO. 92
An ordinance prohibiting the obstruction of streets and alleys, providing a penalty for so doing and defining the duties of the Marshal in connection therewith.
The City of Florence does ordain:
Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to place, or cause to be placed any refuse or rubbish of any kind in or on any of the streets or alleys of the City of Florence.
Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to place, cause to be placed or permit to remain any trash, refuse, rubbish or any lumber, wood or any building material of any kind or to erect, permit to be erected, or allow to remain any building, structure or device of any kind that interferes with the free and unobstructed use of said streets and alleys upon the

half of the street or alley adjacent to the property owned or controlled or managed by them, except as in this act provided.
Section 3. The provision of Section 2 of this ordinance shall not apply to building material stored in a street, provided that the owner of the property adjacent to the half of the street so used shall be actually engaged in building and shall have obtained a written permit from the Councilman in charge of streets or in his absence from the Mayor for the use of the street for storage purposes, which permit shall not be for a period of more than ninety days.
Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Marshal to enforce the provisions of this ordinance; to remove any obstruction in the streets or alleys and the cost of such removal shall be a lien on the abutting property and collected as other liens.
Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof in the Recorder's Court shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars or more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail for not less than two and one half days or more than fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
Section 6. Inasmuch as the City of Florence has no ordinance prohibiting the obstruction of streets and the placing of refuse therein; and as it is necessary for the preservation of the public health and safety that the regulations herein set forth be enacted an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full effect from and after its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.
