The canvassing board working on the election returns in Lane county completed the task of counting and turned the tally sheets over to the county clerk Saturday. The republican totals on the official count resulted as follows:

The Lane county democratic central committee held a meeting in the circuit court room at the court house this afternoon and perfected an organization, re-electing L. M. Travis, as chairman, and J. K. Pratt, as secretary.

An executive committee was selected to have jurisdiction in all matters of a county-wide nature to eliminate the necessity of calling the county committee together from time to time during the campaign. M. S. Wallis was named as a member of the state democratic central committee and Victor L. Holt will represent this county on the congressional campaign committee which will have charge of the campaign of Frederick L. Hollister, Coos county, who has been nominated as the party's candidate for congress.

Thirty of the ninety precincts of the county were represented at the meeting.

Committeemen present were enthusiastic over the nomination of H. L. Bown as the party's candidate for county judge and many of them asserted that he would be elected. A communication was read from J.S. Medley,

whose name was written in almost as many times as that of Mr. Bown, in which Mr. Medley stated:

"I am willing to give Mr. Bown my ungrudging support, and feel with a united effort we will be able to elect him, as well as several other candidates in the coming election."

A communication from Alta King, the only democrat nominated as a candidate for representative was read. Mr. King points out that he is from the southern end of the county.

"In the five precincts in Cottage Grove at the primary," he states, "I received 31 votes more than Mr. Eaton, and 11 votes more than Mr. Fenwick, and Mr. Dillard received only 24 more votes than myself."

"With the strong vote that will come to me here from all parties and independents, if Eugene will give me a reasonable support, Lane county, will have a democratic representative in the next legislature."

ELECTION NOTES

An interesting fact shown by the canvass is that Stacy M. Russell, county clerk, received the nomination for re-election by all three of the parties.

Some of the other Republican candidates received the nomination at the hands of the Democrats, notably Allen H. Eaton and Walter B. Dillard for representatives, but Mr. Eaton has declined to accept and the Democrats will name some other man to run with Alta King, the regular nominee, and Mr. Dillard.

For state senator Fred Fisk, Democrat, and I. H. Bingham, the Republican nominee, were tied. As Mr. Fisk states that he will not accept the nomination, Mr. Bingham will go on the Democratic ticket. The official count shows that Harry Bown was nominated for county judge by the Democrats over John S. Medley. Mr. Bown is former sheriff.

RETREATING ARMY DOUBLY HARASSED
Tampico, May 24.—Brought to a halt in his march to the south, General Morelos Zaragoza, the defeated federal commander of the Tampico garrison, will have to face in battle once more the constitutionalists who drove him out of this place or enter the wilderness of mountains in the Huasteca district to the west. General Zaragoza was at Ozuluama, about 60 miles from Tampico, yesterday, according to advices received by the constitutionalist commander here, with a force estimated at from 2000 to 3000 men. One thousand constitutionalists under Colonel Rafarrete crossed the river south of here today and moved in the direction of Ozuluama. There is moving northward and slightly toward the interior another force of constitutionalists, of General Candido Aguilar's command, with Ozuluama as the object point also. The federals were not pursued by the constitutionalists while they were near Panuco, in order to prevent the possible destruction of oil properties by the retreating enemy, but when it was learned that Zaragoza had chosen to march to the south through a region sprinkled with prosperous villages and foreign interests, chiefly oil wells, General Caballero ordered a movement that would force him either to stand or deflect his movement to the west. Apparently nothing is being left undone by the new authorities in Tampico to restore the city as rapidly as possible to normal conditions.

THREE LEGGED CALF BORN ON TEN MILE

During the two days of the carnival a couple of young men were showing in a small tent genuine curiosity. They told the public all about their freak, but the first day very few believed their story or had no desire to see the animal. It was some different on the second afternoon. Word had passed around that "Three Pins" was no fake and quite a number of people went in to see for themselves.

"Three pins is a native of Western Lane county, and may some day be used to prove we can raise anything in this coast county."

The calf is a male and healthy, can walk and even kick with that one hind leg. It was born on the ranch of C. E. Stevens, on Ten Mile creek north of Florence, and another peculiar feature about the calf is that it was born on the first day of April.

Frank and Edwin Stevens were the young men who had the animal on exhibition, and they intend to take it to Newport next Fourth of July.

PRIZE POTATOES GROWN ON SAND LOT

At the School Fair was shown six new potatoes, grown by Ermald Agee, which took the blue ribbon.

These potatoes were planted the last of January and the samples dug last Thursday. They are clean and well formed and the six weigh 2 lbs. and 1 oz. and were raised in the sand soil on lot 46, block 6, Millers addition to Florence. Fertilizer from the barn was used, but not more than would be used on any other soil.

Ermald Agee is only fifteen years old and was raised on the Siuslaw river. This is his first year at gardening and the work was taken up by himself and his sister Vesta, aged 13, in order to receive credits in school for agriculture.

Besides potatoes they are raising onions, lettuce, radishes and cabbage.

This boy and girl are raising on a lot in Florence, which is just like any lot in our town, garden truck that is hard to beat by the produce of expert gardeners.

In Florence are found many other gardens that prove the value of our soil for garden purposes.

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
