When you have the spot cash this concern will sell you merchandise no better than your local stores and with very little difference in price, but remember also if you haven't the cash to buy, this concern would not ship you a penny's worth on credit. Then it is you turn to your local merchant to purchase what you need until your money comes in. It is your local merchant who extends you credit when you need it and it is from him you should buy for cash when you have it. Spend your money with your home merchant and eventually you will get a large share of that dollar back—spend it with the mail order house and the dollar is gone forever.

GOVERNMENT WILL GET BUSY ON ROADS

The appropriations for road work in Lane county by the forestry service has been approved and work will be commenced soon.

It is intended to build two miles of road in the Alsea country which will connect the lower Alsea territory and the coast road with the Willamette valley by the way of Monroe.

H. B. Rankin, supervisor of the Siuslaw National Forest will soon hold a conference with Lincoln county officials, with the purpose of beginning work at once.
