

## CANNERY NOW MAKING GOOD RUN ON SALMON

Filling Machine Is Now in Operation and Will Greatly Increase Output Preparation Is Sanitary.

The fishermen have been making fairly good catches this week beginning with Tuesday when 1600 were turned in. Wednesday was better with an increase of 100 or a total of 1700 fish. Thursday the catch was materially larger and the count reached over 2500. Friday resulted in another increase when the count amounted to 2000.

From the time the fish pass a man who springs a counter as each one is tossed by until they reach the retort, it is interesting to watch the process of preparing them for the market.

First the heads, fins, tails are cut off and they are opened, then thrown into a vat of water. Taken from this vat they are thoroughly cleansed and washed under a pipe of running water. They are then placed on a table and with one stroke cut by circular knives into chunks. Next these chunks are split lengthwise of the fish and are ready to go in the cans.

Under the hand packing system one chinaman will fill 80 to 100 cases in a day, each case containing 48 cans, making between 4000 and 5000 cans. This week a filling machine has been installed, and Thursday it was in working order, but was only used at half speed, its full

capacity being 65 cans per minute, a little better than 1 can per second. This would give about 3900 cans in an hour, and produce in a days work of 10 hours something like 39000 cans or 1650 cases if kept to its full speed. By hand the present crew used could fill about 250 cases.

Rolling from the filling machine they are inspected and placed in an endless carrier which takes the filled cans through a steam box which extracts the cold air, before they reach the capper.

After leaving the capping machine they pass through a spraying box which washes the outside of the can. Then the cans are placed on trays and tested in a vat for leaks, and passed on to the retorts.

It takes only a few minutes for a fish after going into the filling machine to pass in a almost continuous forward movement to reach the retort.

The process of taking care of the fish is very clean and watching the operations will convince anyone that Wm. Kyle & Sons canned salmon put on the market with up-to-date and sanitary conditions prevailing.

## ALLIES TRYING TO ENVELOP GERMAN FOE

Paris, Sept. 23.—General Joffre, the commander in chief of the French army, is devoting much attention to the western wing on the battle line, where the fighting has been incessant night and day.

The allies since the beginning of the battle of the Aisne have pushed back the Germans a distance of nearly 11 miles, forcing them to seek a further defensive position on the plateaus and in the rough country; which, however, offers excellent opportunities for entrenchment. The headquarters staff has been enabled to make a long movement forward to the north. The town of Soissons has been subjected to a furious bombardment for nine days. The cannonade starts each day at dawn and again at 4 o'clock, continuing until 7 in the evening. The cathedral and other buildings have been greatly damaged.

London, September 23.—According to a message from Paris to the Central news, a Russian cruiser has sunk a German cruiser and two torpedo boats in the Baltic.

Amsterdam, via London, Sept. 23.—The correspondent at Maestricht of the Telegraaf says that during the past few days about 50,000 Germans, wounded on French battle fields, have passed through Liege on the way to Germany.

A news agency dispatch is authority for the statement that the Germans have entrenched and mined the approaches to Brussels and also are fortifying the region around Ath, northwest of Mons, to prevent the Belgians falling on the Germans should a retreat from France be forced.

A German official report says the Russians lost in the battles near Tannenberg, 150,000 men killed and 90,000 captured. Another batch of German prisoners arrived in England yesterday. The Austrian losses are even heavier than those of the Germans and the allies. Up to September 14, according to Russian papers, the Russians have captured seven Austrian flags, 636 guns, 44 machine guns and 64,000 prisoners, including 535 officers.

London, Sept. 22.—The British cruisers Aboukir, Hogue and Cressy, of identical tonnage and armament, were sunk at 7:30 a. m. on the North Sea by five German submarines, according to an official announcement today.

First the Aboukir was torpedoed; as the other vessels drew in to rescue the crew, they in turn were sunk.

The Dutch steamship Triton picked up 114 survivors and others were rescued by H. M. S. Lowestoft, by a division of torpedo-boats destroyers and by trawlers. It is believed the loss of life will be heavy. Each vessel had a complement of 755 men. The displacement of each was 12,000 tons. Their type was comparatively obsolete. All were built in 1900.

Ymuiden, Holland, via London, Sept. 22.—Two of five German submarine boats which attacked and sunk the British cruisers Aboukir, Cressy and Hogue were sent to the bottom by the British ships according to survivors from the cruisers, who arrived here tonight.

## \$20,000,000 BILL PASSED BY SENATE

Washington, Sept. 22.—Passage by the Senate today of a substitute measure providing \$20,000,000 to be expended by the Army Engineers on existing projects finally ended the long filibuster against the river and harbor appropriation bill, which originally carried \$53,000,000. The bill now goes to the House, where it is expected to precipitate another vigorous fight.

When the commerce committee, under the Senate's instructions, brought in the substitute today no show of opposition was offered and the measure passed without a record vote.

Senator Chamberlain, who is likely to be made a member of the conference committee, sees no hope of getting more than a \$20,000,000 bill through at this session.

## EASTERN BROOK TROUT PLANTED IN TRIANGLE LAKE

Estimated That 150 Deer Were Killed in Western Lane County During the Past Season.

The Fish and Game Commission recently planted 15000 Eastern Brook trout in Triangle lake. It is expected that when the railroad is extended into the Siuslaw country and facilities for handling the transportation, the commission will stock several of our lakes and streams with different kinds of fish.

The fish hatchery at Deadwood has completed a new salmon rack to keep the fish back so they can be secured by the hatchery men.

It has been estimated that about 150 Columbia black tailed deer have been killed by hunters in Western Lane and Douglas during the past season. The open season for hunting deer was closed by the governor under the state forestry law, for fourteen days. This was done as a prevention of forest fires.

The open season on deer closes according to the game laws October 31st.

The following extract from the Fish and Game Laws will be of interest.

Rates for Hunters' and Anglers' Licenses.  
Residence Hunter's License \$1.00 per year.  
Non-Resident Hunter's License \$10.00 per year.

Resident or Non-Resident Angler's License \$1.00 per year. Hunters' and anglers' licenses may be secured from any county clerk by applying in person, or by application signed by two freeholders on regular blank which may be obtained from county clerk.

It is unlawful for aliens to hunt and angle without first having obtained a \$25.00 gun license and both hunters' and anglers' licenses.

The following open seasons—all dates inclusive, District No. 1—Comprising all counties west of the Cascade Mountains. Buck deer—August 1 to October 31.

Silver gray squirrel—October 1 to October 31.

Ducks and geese—Federal law now in force—October 1 to January 15.

Rails and coots—Federal law now in force—October 1 to January 15.

Shore birds, black breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jack snipe, woodcock, and greater and lesser yellow-legs—Federal law now in force—October 1 to December 15.
