

REGULAR SESSION OF THE COUNCIL

At the council meeting held Monday evening, there were present C. D. Morey, mayor, D. W. Reese and Fred Myers, councilmen.

The City attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance to condemn part of lots 1 and 2, in block 9 of the original plat of Florence. This property is at the intersection of Adams and 2nd street.

The matter of planking of Madison to 1st street, thence west on 1st to Jackson street was taken up and a set of viewers consisting of S. C. Carlson, D. D. Pendergraft and A. O. Knowles were appointed to lay off the district and report to the council the probable cost of the enterprise.

Ordinance No. 101, prohibiting the erection or maintenance of certain partitions, screens, blinds or other devices in card rooms, pool rooms and billiard rooms in the City of Florence, and providing a penalty for violations of this ordinance, was read the second time and held for its final passage.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE TO TOUR STATE

Portland, Dec. 8.—As a great many of the farmers of Oregon find it impossible to attend the short sessions of the O. A. C. at Corvallis, school will be loaded upon a special train and taken over the state in order to distribute important instruction almost at the farmer's door. The first sessions of this traveling school will be held at Molalla and Estacada beginning Dec. 8. Although the complete schedule has not been definitely arranged, it has been decided that there will be 24 sessions in 24 different parts of the state, each session lasting five days, the school term ending March 27.

Six members of the staff of the extension division of the college work will give up all their time to this instruction, discussing all the important phases of production and marketing, special attention being given to local problems. Certain subjects will be treated on certain days, making it possible for a busy man to attend only on the day when the special subject in which he is interested is taken up.

While the number of exhibits was not so large this year as at the last show, the standard of the poultry shown was considerably better.

During the two days show a continuous string of visitors were in attendance, and even many came late Saturday afternoon expecting to see the birds, although they had all been taken away.

The number of exhibits was 25 coops and some excellent birds were shown.

The scoring judge was N. B. Hull of Glenada.

A count on eggs layed during the two days exhibit was kept and Geo. Montgomery's pen of Barred Rocks was highest. Three pullets laying four eggs. I. B. Cushman's two pens of white Leghorns, second with three eggs.

A suggestion has been made to have a special poultry exhibit in March 1915, and one man has offered \$5 to help finance such a proposition.

The total vote cast was 90 and the women were out in force.

SIOUSLAW IS INCLUDED IN ESTIMATE

Washington, Dec. 7—More than \$53,000,000 is estimated for improvements and maintenance of the nation's waterways and harbors during the fiscal year of 1916, which begins July 1, 1915.

The great waterways require the larger part of the money. The total of the works is made up of a comparatively small number of large items and a comparatively large number of small items.

Estimates of appropriations for the Columbia river are: Mouth, \$1,750,000; Columbia and Lower Willamette, \$600,000; at Cascades, \$10,000; at Three Mile Rapids \$80,000; Upper Columbia and Snake rivers \$65,000; Coos Bay harbor \$80,000; Nehalem bay, \$116,175; Coquille river \$76,000; Siuslaw river \$117,500 (provided an equal amount is appropriated by the port of Siuslaw or other agency); Willamette and Yamhill rivers \$42,500; Tillamook bay and bar \$207,000.

C. A. Cruzan of Lang, California arrived in Florence Saturday having come from Southern California to look at a homestead 25 miles north of here. This land was represented to him as being creek bottom and nearly all suitable to cultivation. This is another of a long list of persons who have been deceived by the unreliable reports sent out from this locality.
