Board Meeting.

The executive board of the O. S. S. U. held a regular meeting at Liberal Hall, Sunday morning. All the members of the board were present either in person or by proxy. Attention was called to the omission of the president's decision in the minutes of the last special meeting of the board. The decision was in substance that the officers, and not the offices, of the O.S.S. U. con stitute the executive board, and therefore E. L. Smith was only entitled to one vote although he held two offices. Secretary Smith admitted that the decision was made, but refused to make the correction to the minutes unless the board voted for him to do so.
