## Excommunication and Curses.

A recent telegram from St. Josgives account of the excommunication of Miss Katherine Moriarity, participated in her wedding and reception which followed, because the young woman was married by a Protestant minister. The official annonncement of such excommunication was made in formal manner by Right Rev. Bishop Burke. The letter was directed to Rev. Father Newman, pastor of the Cathedral congregation. Says the dispatch: "It was read at all the services in the Cathedral."

Miss Moriarity was married to Chas. A. Miller at the First Presbyterian church by Rev. George A Trenholm. After the marriage a reception was held at the home of the bride's mother.

The offense, with such a terrible penalty, was not one against good morals, nor for even a change in belief, but for paying a Protestant minister a fee which should have gone into the purse of a Catholic priest. Its severity was evidently designed to intimidate others and prevent a like occurrence.

Excommunication is one of the penalties, like every rite, ceremony and practice of the mother church, including its holy days, its festivals, its masses, its grand te deums, which it inherited from its Pagan ancestors. Says Chambers' Encyclopedia, article "Excommunication:"

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
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
