
#### Scientific Wisdom.

I cannot get time to finish revising the "plan". Writing the tracts and securing their distribution is of first importance. They opened the way for Sunday scientific meetings here, and will elsewhere if the Freethinkers have-confidence in themselves and really want such meetings in their own homes. find it is not necessary to wait for lectures nor lessons. We have had three meetings, and anybody else can have meetings who want them enough to put forth any effort. Half the Christians do not like the bible well enough to read it. They would rather hear something that will teach them something practically beneficial. It is our own cowardice, laziness or indifference, if we do not start and keep up such meetings.

Distribute some tracts, and find which of your neithbors like them. Invite those to your house for a Sunday Scientific meeting. Have whatever music and singing you can get that is free from religious cant. Read an article from a scientific Magazine or high-school book, or on some political or reform question for the main paper. Don't select anything long or dry. Read a short article from a Freethought paper, then read a selection from a school physiology or a health magazine for the hygienic lesson. Discussion may follow either of these. Then be sure to read the morality and nature lessons in the "Little Candle", using the questions or not, as you have time. Have the children learn the stanzas at home and recite them at the meeting. Select the best readers to read these lessons and selections, and use pictures, minerals, and whatever else you can to illustrate. You will find your neighbors have more appreciation of what is good and willingness to learn, than you ever gave them credit for.
