Psychologists have undertaken the scientific study of dreams. When the olfactory sense of a sleeper is stimulated by an odor, such as heliotrope, not only does he dream of "smelling violets", but visual images of flowers appear to him. A vibrating tuning fork held near a sleeper's ear made him dream of a lion roaring, and when a little salt and water was put or his tongue he dreamed that he was eating olives.

It has been long known, says a Cheyenne dispatch, that Wyoming was the graveyard of the largest animals which have at any time inhabited the earth. Professor W. H. Reid, of the department of geology of the state university, while exploiting the fossil fields of Albany county, about 90 miles northwest of Laramie, during last August, discovered the fossil skeleton of the largest animal yet found in the world. The monster was a dweller in the jurassic age, known to scientists as a dinosaur, measuring nearly 130 feet in length, estimated to have been 30 feet in height at the hips and 25 feet at the shoulders, its petrified skeleton weighing more than 40,000 pounds. The only known fossil which approximates this dinosaur in size is the celebrated brontosaur in the Yale College museum, discovered some years ago in Wyoming by Professor O. C. Marsh. > Already preparations are making for the observation of the total eclipse of the sun, which will be visible in this country a year from next May, the track crossing the southern states from Texas to North Carolina. The visibility of a total solar eclipse at any given place on the earth is so rare a phenomenon that when it occurs in an easily accessible region it is certain to attract multitudes of observers. Prof. F. H. Bigelow has just investigated the weather probabilities for this eclipse, and he announces that the chances for clear weather will be best in the northern parts of Georgia and Alabama, where the land lies high.
