Everybody Eats, Nobody Hits, Then We Talk

Plate Theory

This week (in geological terms) we find ourselves whirling over the surface of a ball of hot rock on plates of colder rock. Where the edges of the plates meet, a great deal of bumping and scooting (scientific terminology) tends to go on, which makes the plates rattle. Songwriter Michael Hurley, who was performing in San Francisco in fall of 1989, likened a major quake to "being a kid, and it's like the first time your old man hits you." This is a remarkable simile, suggesting that the very foundations of life cannot be trusted, and that the realization is abrupt.

Some of us, in our spin over the ball of rock, have life served to us on silver plates. It usually looks great, and although it is often bland, we are told it is very, very, very good.

Others have no plates at all and it's just as well, for they rarely have anything to put on them, nor anyplace to keep them.

Producing and marketing pieces of silver plate life occupies much of the energy in this culture. The remainder, with a few exceptions, is allotted to pills, pet food, laundry detergent, and expensive military hardware.

One theory has it that although most folks are busy buying facimilies of pieces of silver platter life, the sheer number of those with nothing on their plates can create an imbalance. In a time when all are constantly reminded of the gap between the silver plate and empty plate realities, this is even more likely. Such an imbalance causes the silver plates to wobble and spill.

The inequities in our culture are acknowledged by most of us. The rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happi-



ness are limited, especially for women, and for all whose skin is not pink. These rights are limited when they interfere with economic growth.

Some raise their voices in outrage at injustice, at lack of opportunity in housing, education, and employment, or at lack of genuine representation in government. These may be thought of as symptoms.

It may be oversimplification to want a society where everyone eats, no one hits, and there is enough of everything for the kids and the old folks, but we might be more concerned with the needs of the living than with the protection of capital. Perhaps, now, pruning and refinement are more important than unhindered growth to give us all a garden we can live in happily.

Then green then blue then back

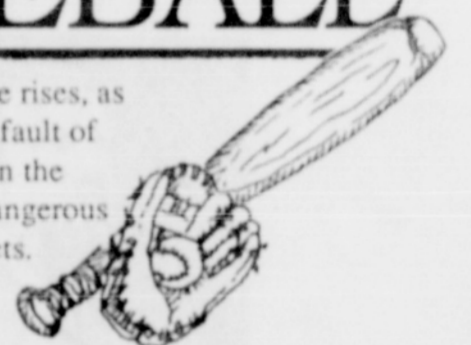
A boy of nine

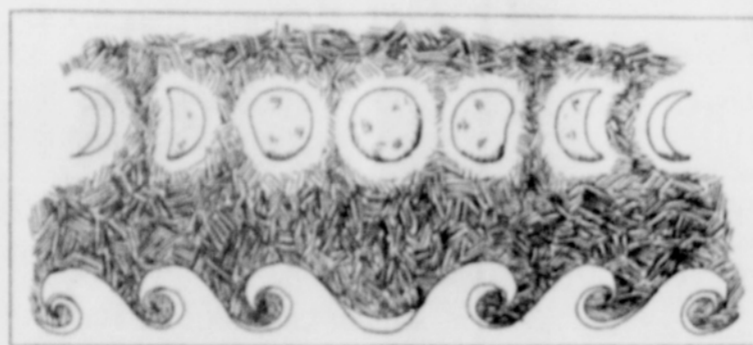
