

CUB LAUNCHES MEMBERSHIP DRIVE TO FIGHT FOR RATEPAYERS

The Citizens' Utility Board (CUB) of Oregon has declared three issues as critical for utility ratepayers in the next decade: the cost of closing Trojan, new sources of energy to replace Trojan and access to the "information age" in telecommunications.

CUB was created by voters in the 1984 election to represent ratepayers before the state's Public Utility Commission. Since its creation CUB has participated in dozens of utility cases and saved Oregon ratepayers \$300 million.

"We can't be comfortable with the successes we've had," said Bob Jenks, CUB's program director. "We now have three issues, which are each as large as any fight we've ever had, heading straight towards ratepayers. We've set a goal of doubling our membership, which is currently at 14,000 in order to support these cases."

The three issues are:

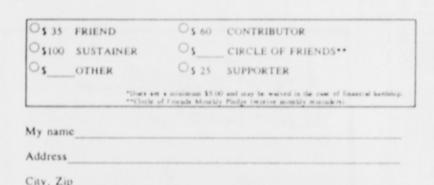
"The cost of closing Trojan. PGE has estimated this cost at \$861 million (\$1000/customer) and said it is a responsibility of ratepayers to pay these costs. When other Oregon companies make bad investments, they cut earnings and reduce expenses. CUB will be working to insure that PGE and its stockholders pay their fair share of the costs of Trojan.

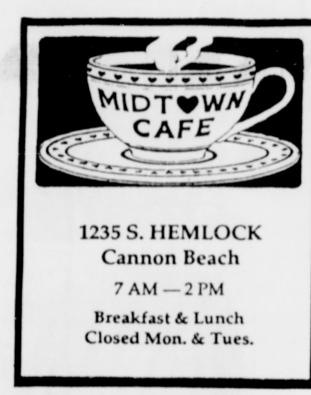
*New source of energy. With Trojan closing down and Portland's population growing, the region needs to develop new sources of power. The cheapest source, and the one that will reduce monthly bills, is conservation. PGE — whose profits are tied to the amount of electricity they sell -- is proposing a series of expensive new natural gas power plants. CUB will be working to ensure that the region first taps into the cheap potential of weatherization and other conservation resources.

*Access to the Information Age. The PUC, the FCC and Congress will soon be making decisions which will shape the future of the information age. The large phone companies want to ensure that they have a monopoly on the information services which are sent over the phone lines. advocates that local phone companies be common carriers of many different services. In addition CUB is proposing that access to information services be introduced as part of the universal service package which is offered at low cost to all telephone consumers.

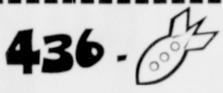

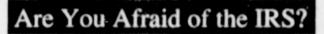
Is a phone number to call to confess your sins. You may also listen to the sins of others.

Respecting salmon culture

A statement to encourage discussion and help move towards a vision of ecovery for our watersheds and the life and livelihoods dependent on them

The salmon, its waterways, and the ways of life which continue to depend on it, represent the inseparable connection between nature and culture, as well as the dangerous path we have taken with our exploitation of natural resources, invasive technologies, and irresponsible pursuit of economic

Any process which tries to resolve the ongoing crisis of salmon run depletion and salmon habital destruction needs to look at the continuing conflict between the dominant Euro-american institutions and ways of life and the surviving Indian fishing communities. And it needs to directly involve these indigenous salmon-based societies of the N'chi wana (the Columbia) and other river basins of the in "managing" the resource and "regulating" its use, and should be able to provide helpful leadership in restoring balance to the relationship between human society and the natural environment. Out of this can hopefully come a truly inclusive and realistic vision for dealing with thi cultural and ecological crisis.

The salmon is one part of a complex web of ecological and cultural relationships. Like the first salmon feasts celebrating the abundant return of this region's Indigenous people's primary food source, and praying for its continued abundance, there are also root and berry feasts still celebrated The entire landscape was a cultural resource area: for fishing, food and medicine gathering, hunting, and also for continuing ceremonial traditions. Just as certain usual and accustomed places were respectfully used for obtaining subsistence foods and medicines, and protected for future generations, so also certain places had traditional ceremonial uses.

The coming of Euro-American cultural ways and attitudes unfortunately conflicted with and came to dominate these older connections between humans and our environment. We now see the results of this historical process: the destruction of the salmon runs, the reckless cutting of our ancient forests, and the general degradation of our natural

It is perhaps the breaking of a spiritual link between ourselves and the rest of nature, of an attitude of reverence and respect, that is both a cause and a result of this situation. In order to restore a healthy relationship, and to begin healing damaged eco systems, we must respect and protect the places held as special or sacred to the people whose ancestors and cultures have dwelled in this land for thousands of years.

As we look back on the 200 years since Captain Gray entered the mouth of N'chi-wana, the river he called Columbia, and, the 150 years since the mass migration of Euro-american immigrants began over the Oregon Trail, it is a good time to assess the legacy of both our Euro- and Native American cultural heritage. And perhaps we can begin a process of reconciliation and renewal that is so needed in these times of increasing strife and of forests, rivers, fish and wildlife found here by Lewis and Clark and the first Euro-american traders



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
