
One more community note and then we can move on. Recyclingillill Your beloved editor got lucky this month and was given the privilege of being Recycling Volunteer Co-ordinator for July. The Co-ordinator signs up folks to serve one hour a year to help at the recycling center. The fun was that folks from all walks of life in our community were happy to spend an hour (some many more) to keep our Recycling program one of best in the country for the size of the community.

The Cannon Beach Recycling program is one of the true "Community" projects in town. It began over 15 years ago, and in spite of Bureaucratic indifference, political manipulation, Budget attacks, Union abandonment, and business disdain, it has survived and prospered; thanks in large measure lately, to the stead hand and clear head of John Rippey, and a host of folks who demand the best for the community.

We at this paper believe that the Cannon Beach Recycling program should not only be given the full support of the people in the community, but of the City Government and the City Manager

We believe that educating the public, both local, and our quest from around the world, about Recycling in general and our system in particular should be one of our top priorities; and we urge others to pass this message on to the powers that be. We believe that it is important to inform our visitors about the bottle bill, for example, so they don't toss aluminum cans in with the trash, our curbside program, so they can participate while they visit, and maybe take this information home to their own communities. We should encourage folks to take a walk down by the lagoons and see what people can do sometimes in spite of the lack of commitment by their Government. The people of Cannon Beach started this program years before any of our current office holders were elected or hired, and the people have had to fight every step of the way; well, folks another one is needed. We need to quit hiding our light under a bushel or a cardboard box for that matter, and make education and information a priority in our future efforts. For example, we have to change the idea that Recycling and Garbage Collection are the same thing. The latter is removing waste, the former is reclaiming resources. Everytime you recycle a can you are doing a little consumer style mining, you are a logger when you bundle your newspapers and cardboard, and with every aluminum can you return for a refund, a salmon has increased its chances to make it to the ocean, where you are helping our fishermen.
