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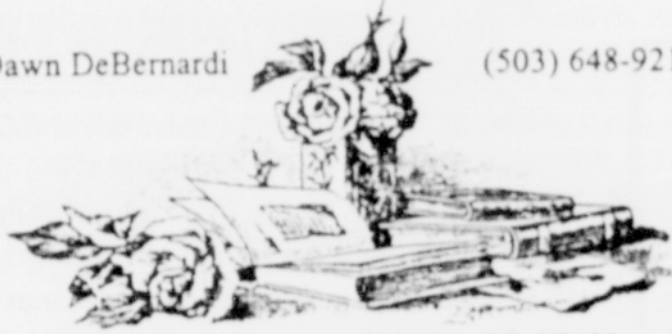

facility was enlarged. This gave the program the ability to ship directly to markets, thus increasing efficiency and revenues.

**13. City Hall Energy Audit**

Jerome Arnold conducted an energy consumption audit of city buildings based on the 1993 energy demands. In 1993 the expenditure for energy use at city hall was \$5,720.00 for electricity and \$962.00 for natural gas, totaling \$6,682.00. Mr. Arnold researched data beginning in 1989 to develop a detailed report for the city on behalf of the Energy Committee. The following is a synopsis of his recommendations.

**A. Replacement of heat pumps in the council chamber and city offices with gas furnaces.** Possible removal and relocation of gas furnace from Police Station to city offices.

**B. Reduction of lighting costs by partial delamping of fixtures, use of more efficient ballasts, and utilization of occupancy switches.**

(These changes would result in a 14-15% reduction in consumption.)

**C. Installation of shop area ceiling with foil faced R-19 insulation batts between joists. Sealing air leaks around sliding doors. Installation of a programmable thermostat. Block off area above public works office with a curtain wall.**

(These measures should decrease shop energy consumption by 50%. The total heat costs incurred by the shop area are 1/2 of the city hall heat costs, therefore equalling a 25% decrease in the total city hall energy consumption.)

**14. P. P. & L. Energy Consumption Program**

In May 1994 the Energy Committee and the City of Cannon Beach implemented an experimental program with Pacific Power and Light which encourages reduced use of electricity during the peak hours of 7AM - 5PM Mon - Fri by offering lower rates for off-peak hours. The program was offered to the residents who had highest consumption rates. P. P. & L. will also conduct an energy audit of each house, water heater blankets, shower head kits, and energy conservation information.

**15. Post Office Recycling**

At this time the Cannon Beach Post Office in co-operation with the City provides recycling of newsprint, magazines, and telephone books that are generated through postal boxes. This is the only customer driven recycling program in a post office in Oregon.

**16. City Aesthetic Liveability**

The city works to retain the liveability of Cannon Beach by controlling the aesthetic and environmental building needs. The Design/Review Committee carefully addresses all building and signage issues for buildings larger than single family dwellings. The city also has a mandate that prohibits formula food restaurants.

**17. City Land Use**

The City Council will appoint a blue ribbon committee at the August 1994 council meeting to research the community's future land use issues. The shrinking resources of lands available and the various uses for those lands need to be investigated regarding their suitability, possible co-operative use, and the feasibility of those uses. Possible uses include a park, a new school, an arts center, a public works yard, and a sports field.

**18. Land Management Issues**

The city government has initiated communications with private landowners regarding watershed, erosion, aesthetic beauty and environmental issues.

**19. Haystack Rock Awareness Project**

The program is run by volunteers and part time employees who interpret and help the public to understand the complex marine ecosystem of Haystack Rock. It is supported by private donations. The City of Cannon Beach, School District #10, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and the Oregon Dept. of Fish & Wildlife help by providing materials and resources to the program.

**20. Community Energy Conservation Forums**

The energy committee will be presenting on-going public forums on various topics such as, but not limited to, solar energy, consumerism, conservation rebates, etc.

**21. Spanish Language Recycling Brochure**

A brochure has been developed and will be distributed to our residents who speak Spanish describing the correct use of our recycling program.

**22. Composting & Mulching**

The city is in the process of purchasing a chipper and will then implement a municipal composting & mulching program. This will eliminate the need for the burn pile.

**23. Bike Lanes**

The city is continuing to expand and develop bicycle lanes through the use of state and city funds.
