GIVING BACK TO THE EARTH: Phone Book Recycling and Earth Day Traditions




The old telephone directory recycling program that was operated in Astoria, Seaside and Cannon Beach in January and February this year was a success. US West sponsored the program that collected 8,544 phone books. This is the first year that the three cities collaborated with US West to collect phone books. The City of Cannon Beach has independently operated phone book recycling programs in the past and is proud to have participated in a joint effort to help reduce our tonnage at the local landfills. Cannon Beach residents brought in 3,400 of the 8,400 pounds collected in the county. US West will send the old directories to Daishowa Paper Mill's Recycling Plant in Port Angeles, WA, to be processed into new phone books. This means that in Clatsop County we have eliminated 8,400 pounds of refuse from our landfill. Special thanks and many hugs to our wonderful Postal staff members who donated space & time to this project. Not to mention all the great folks at City Hall, the volunteers, local businesses and everyone who took the time to bring in their phone books. This is a great example of how each of us can contribute to an environmental issue and make a difference.



This is the kind of short term bureaucratic thinking that has no place in Cannon Beach. The volunteers who built the original recycling center now see their labors in the service of police storage and general stuff, while recyclable material goes to a landfill. We, the taxpaying, volunteering citizens are being poorly served when this sort of attitude prevails. When a person lugs a stack of old phonebooks to the post office, where the workers voluntarily placed a barrel, then another volunteer helps get them to the recycling center, and then they are hauled to a landfill. . . well, it would save more energy to just throw them in the garbage can in the first place. No, this must not happen ever again, and an explanation and an apology should be forthcoming from those responsible.)

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS City Council Worksession

February 28

+ The City Council held a worksession to discuss the Storm Drainage Master Plan; Oregon Department of Transportation tourist-oriented directional signs and the commendations of the county-wide E-911 response committee

+Brad Moore of Kramer Chin & Mayo, the city's engineering firm, and members of the Public Works Committee reviewed the storm drainage proposal with

+Tom Halsey and Cheryl Gribskov of the Oregon Department of Transporta-tion (ODOT) answered questions for Councilors regarding a new "tourist-oriented directional (TOD) signage" program which would permit certain tourist-oriented businesses to have signs placed along Highway 101, in addition to the gas, food and lodging signs already in place. The ODOT staff will provide the city with additional information on the number and types of existing signs; City Councilors were told by Halsey and Gribskov that since the city rather than the State now has full responsibility for Hemlock Street, the city can determine whether it wishes to retain the directional signs that are currently in place at Sunset Blvd and Hemlock Street.

+Council received a report from Police Chief Dave Rouse on the work and recommendations of the E-911 Committee. Based on information from Rouse, the Councilors expressed concern that funding for the creation of a new E-911 service center might be based on assessed property valuations which would leave Cannon Beach and Arch Cape paying a disproportionately high percentage of the overall costs relative to the size of the south county population using 911 services. Councilors discussed the feasibility of maintaining our present 911 services through the Seaside dispatch center by forming a south county service district.

CITY COUNCIL MARCH 7

+Held a public hearing on Scanlan Kemper Bard Companies request for Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Ordinance text amendments to permit the establishment of the oceanfront setback line for lots as part of the subdivision approval process. Counci, tentatively approved the changes, pending preparation of an ordinance to be considered at Council's April 11 meeting.

+Held a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the Municipal Code to establish off-street parking standards in a defined downtown C1 zoned district. After the public hearing, Councilors decided to discuss the proposal further at a worksession on March 27.

+Held a public hearing on a City of Cannon Beach application for amendments to the Comprehensive Plan Background Report and to the Comprehensive Plan policies regarding parks and recreation The proposed amendments consisted mainly of housekeeping changes and updates to reflect actions already taken in the area of parks over the last several years. Councilors offered several amendments to the proposal and tentatively voted to adopt the changes, pending preparation of ordinances to be considered at the April Council meeting

+Discussed whether to accept a COPS FAST grant, available through the federal crime bill, which would partially fund the salary for an additional full time police officer over a three year period. Grant funds total approximately \$75,000 and a minimum of \$25,000 in city matching funds would be required over the three years. Councilors determined to seek additional background information on the grant program and consider the request further as part of the budget process.

+Considered a resolution prepared by the county-wide Emergency 911 Committee recommending support for consolidation of the present two 911 centers (Seaside and Astoria) into a single "enhanced" 911 center. Councilors had discussed this issue at an earlier worksession and voted to not adopt the resolution and to direct staff to notify the county's 911 Committee that Cannon Beach would not find the concept of a new center acceptable without assurance

that funding for the center would be based on population rather than assessed

+Accepted a report and recommendations from an ad hoc Police Housing Committee. The committee, comprised of former mayor Herb Schwab, former city councilor George Shields and present councilor Frank Little, recommended that the city eliminate the requirement for police officers to live within eight miles of the Cannon Beach city limits if, in negotiation with the police bargaining unit of Oregon Public Employees Union, there is agreement that officers' compensated time will not include travel time when called back to duty in Cannon Beach.

◆Received a report of the Blue Ribbon Committee on Future Space Needs of Cannon Beach and directed staff to schedule a forum to gather public input on the Committee's recommendations. The public forum will be held Appli 10 at 7:00 pm at City Hall; see additional information in this issue of Muni Memo.

+ Received a Storm Drainage Master Plan that was developed by the city's engineers, Kramer Chin Mayo, and subsequently reviewed and reviewed by the Public Works Committee. Council will discuss the plan further with the Public Works Committee members at the March 27 worksession and will consider funding of the plan components during the budgetary process.

+ Appointed Nancy Littell to fill a vacancy on the Budget Committee.

+With a 3:2 vote, did not adopt a resolution stating support for the Oregon Transportation Funding proposal which includes an increase in the gas tax to fund highway and bridge improvements throughout the

+Unanimously adopted final findings of fact upholding the Planning Commission's denial of a request for approval of the Holland Addition, a proposed subdivision to create 11 lots from a 4.04 acre parcel of land. (A)

+ Heard a report by Vic Stamm urging the City Council to take action to study alternatives to the north entrance to Cannon Beach. Stamm favors consideration of development of 2nd Street into the main means of egress from the city to Highway 101. The city is investigating funding possibilities to permit further study of the

The Planning Commission tentatively ap proved the subdivision request, subject to many conditions; final findings of fact approving the subdivision plat, with conditions, were subsequently adopted at a special Planning Commission meeting on March 7. +Held a public hearing on a City of Cannon Beach application for amendments to the Comprehensive Plan Background Report and to the Comprehensive Plan policies regarding parks and recreation. The proposed amendments consist primarily of housekeeping changes and updates to reflect actions already taken in the area of parks over the last several years. Commissioners voted to recommend adoption of the amendments to City Council.

+Held a public hearing on Bingham application for a five foot front yard setback reduction in conjunction with the construction of a garage on property located at 3116 S. Pacific. The Planning Commission approved the request which requires demolition of an existing garage structure that encroaches into the street right of way and permits construction of a replacement garage within the Bingham's property boundaries. (D)

+Held a public hearing and approved a conditional use request by the City of Cannon Beach to permit the construction of a children's play area at Tolovana Wayside Park. The park property is owned by the State of Oregon; the State Department of Parks and Recreation has given permission for use of park property and has offered assistance in the preparation of the site for locating the play structure. (E)

+Continued consideration and voted to deny an after-the-fact setback reduction application by Earl Twietmeyer for prop erty located at 447 N. Larch Street. (F) +-+

SHORT TERM RENTAL **PUBLIC FORUM HELD**

A Public Forum on Short Term Rentals was held on Saturday, February 18 at City Hall. The Short Term Rental Review Committee had made several recommendations to City Council which included establishing stronger local management requirements; making the occupancy limitations of each rental unit more realistic in relation to the size of the unit and the parking spaces provided, establishing a system for random room tax and building safety audits; continuing to allow the licensing of existing short term rent-als for another three years beyond February, 1997 but allowing no new short term rentals.

The recommendations have been forwarded to the Planning Commission by the council where they will identify necessary amendments to the Municipal Code to implement any or all of the recommendations. For further information, call 503-436-1581.


