

WHY RECYCLE???

Did you know that Oregonians produce more than 5000 tons of garbage every day? That is enough to cover one acre of land 8 feet deep. 30% of the weight and 50% of the volume in Oregon landfills is derived from product packaging which includes paper, cardboard, plastic, and misc. "other things". Paper products alone generate 29.6% of the total volume in landfills. If this isn't enough to inspire you to reuse products, reduce your consumption, and recycle what you can not reuse, then here are a few facts to mull over.....

Making aluminum from recycled aluminum uses 90% less energy than making it from scratch.... The energy saved from one recycled aluminum can will operate a TV for 3 hours.

Recycled glass lowers the melting temperature for making new glass therefore saving 32% of the energy....The energy saved from 1 glass bottle will light a 100 watt bulb for 4 hours.

Tin cans are made from tin-plated steel. These metals are mined from ore deposits or dredged from river gravel. Most mining and dredging sites are located in tropical forests. This has an impact on fish and aquatic species by disrupting their habitats in riverbeds and causing erosion. It is estimated that virgin tin supplies will be depleted in 25 years at the current consumption rates.....70-80% of tin is saved when you recycle it.

Each ton of paper made from recycled paper instead of trees saves approx. 17 trees, 4,100 kilowatt hours of energy (which is enough to operate an average US household for 4 months), 7,000 gallons of water (enough drinking water for 30 people per year), 60 pounds of pollutants and 3 cubic yards of landfill space.

A running faucet uses 3-5 gallons of water per minute. It takes 30 gallons of water to wash dishes, 150 to wash a car, 5 to brush your teeth and 30 to shave your face.

To be composted it will take the following time: a traffic ticket: 2-4 weeks, tin can : 100 years, wool sock: 1 year, cotton T-shirt: 5-9 months, rope: 3-14 months, soda can: 200-500 years and a 6 pack plastic ring: 450 years.

POST OFFICE UPDATE:

Our always vigilant postal workers report approximately a 50% reduction in the accumulated lobby trash after the new recycling depot was installed!! For the most part participants are using the system correctly and often. Remember that those little index size cards we receive from Safeway and other advertisers can not be recycled with the newsprint. Please place them in the bin marked "detached labels". If they are in with the newsprint they must be hand sorted, which is time consuming.

Please only recycle materials you receive in the mail at the Post Office Depot. Household recyclables can be placed outside with the curbside pickup. If you do not know when it is you may call City Hall at 436-1581 for info. or bring it down to the recycling depot next to the waste water treatment plant. The recycling depot is open daily from 8AM-5PM and Recycle Saturdays are the first and third Saturdays of the month from 9AM to 1PM. Yard Waste may be dropped off every Saturday between 10 & 12PM and 4 to 4:45PM. Commercial cardboard drop-off times are every Tuesday and Thursday from 8 to 11AM.



Municipal Memo

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS
PLANNING COMMISSION
May 25

+Held a public hearing on SUB 95-01, Shorewood Associates application for tentative plan approval for a 19 lot subdivision, including 17 lots for the construction of duplexes. The property consists of a 3.53 acre parcel of land bordered by Spruce Street on the west, Highway 101 on the east and Gower Street on the north. The property is zoned R2, Residential Medium Density. At the request of a participant, the record on the matter was held open for the submittal of additional written testimony. The Planning Commission will consider the request at the June 22 meeting. (A)

+Held a public hearing on a request by Sandra Larson for a Comprehensive Plan/Zoning Ordinance map amendment to include property within the urban growth boundary and to designate the property RL, Residential Lower Density. The property, 3.4 Acres, is located east of Highway 101 off Sunset Blvd. The Planning Commission will recommend approval of the request to the City Council. (B)

+Considered a request by Robert and Jo Ann Norrie for two variances in association with a lot line adjustment at 286 Kemal Street. The applicants wish to create a second oceanfront lot in association with their existing house at the west end of Kemal Street in Toloovana Park. The public hearing was held at the April meeting and, at the request of the applicant, the record was held open for the submission of additional evidence. After discussion, the Planning Commission voted to deny the variance requests. (C)

+Held a discussion regarding brew pubs (microbreweries) at the request of Christopher James of DDAJ Corporation. James proposes including a 200 square foot brew pub area as a component of a 3000 square foot eating and drinking establishment (Puffins Restaurant) in Toloovana Park. After discussion, the Planning Commission agreed that a microbrewery could be considered an accessory use to an eating and drinking establishment with a maximum size ratio of 30:70 brew pub to eating and drinking establishment. (D)

CITY COUNCIL
June 6, 1995

+Held a public hearing on the City of Cannon Beach application for Zoning Ordinance text amendments regarding transient occupancy of dwelling units (short term rentals). The Council tentatively approved the proposed recommendations which include:

- Extending the phase out period for an additional three years;
- Revising the standards for maximum permitted occupancy so that occupancy is based on the number of bedrooms rather than square footage; Maximum occupancy will also be limited based on the number of off-street parking spaces provided by the rental unit;
- Changing the qualifications and duties of the local representative; making provisions for random financial audits of room tax statements similar to those conducted on motels; and establishing an ongoing system of building inspections, particularly for identification of fire or safety hazards;
- And establishing a regulation that a person may hold no more than one transient rental business license.

Staff will prepare an ordinance addressing these provisions to be considered by Council at the July 11 meeting.

+Held a public hearing regarding a City of Cannon Beach application for Zoning Ordinance text amendments to make provisions and set standards for Assisted

Living Facilities as conditional uses in the R3, RM, RAM and C1 zones. After the public hearing, Councilors directed staff to clarify several points and bring a revised proposal for consideration at the July Council meeting.

+Read by title only for the second time and adopted Ordinance 95-07, establishing off-street parking standards for the downtown C1 zone.

+Appointed Mayor Kirk Anderson Council representative to Clatsop Tillamook Intergovernmental Council (CTIC) and appointed Councilor Karolyn Adamson to the Clatsop County Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Committee.

+Held over consideration of a proposed ordinance extending the city's franchise agreement with Pacific Power for electric services.

+Set an August 1 hearing date for the remand of a LUBA appeal by Jack Kaady regarding the city's 1993 determination that the Toloovana Inn is a motel and not subject to the city's short term rental regulations. (E)

+Held over consideration of an ordinance addressing required screening of two cubic yard trash containers and also held over discussion of city policy regarding support of programs at Cannon Beach Elementary School.

+Set a special meeting date on Tuesday, June 20 at 7:00 pm to consider budget matters and other items of Council business, to be followed by a worksession regarding the extension of sidewalks on Sunset Boulevard from Spruce Street to Elk Creek Road and consideration of policy regarding city financial support for School District 10 projects.

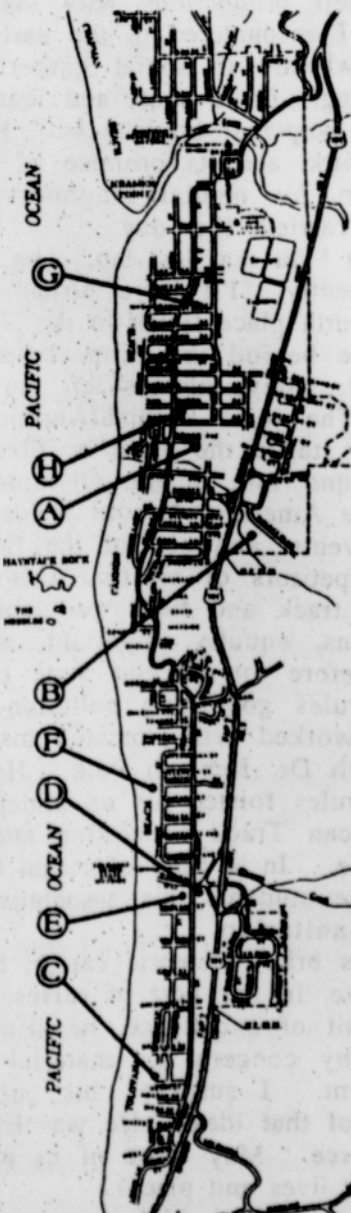
HAYSTACK ROCK AWARENESS PROGRAM BEGINS

POST OFFICE UPDATE

Postal workers at the Cannon Beach Post Office report that there has been an approximate 50% reduction in accumulated lobby trash after the new recycling depot was installed by Energy Committee members and City workers.

Participants appear to be using the system correctly and often. A reminder: the index-size cards received from Safeway and other advertisers cannot be recycled with the newsprint and should be placed in the bin marked "detached labels." If they are placed in with the newsprint, they must be hand sorted, a time consuming task. Only recycle materials received in the mail should be put into the bins. Household recyclables should be recycled through the curbside program or may be brought to the recycling center next to the wastewater treatment plant. The recycling center is open daily from 8 am-5 pm. Recycle Saturdays are the first and third Saturdays of the month from 9 am to 1 pm. Yard waste may be dropped off every Saturday between 10 and 12 pm and 4 to 4:45 pm.
