

Packaging Waste

in 1960 the United States produced 26 million tons of packaging waste. By 1995 we were producing 63 million tons!. Even with the upswing in recycling over the last 35 years this demonstrates an increase of 37 million tons of waste a year.

How to reduce the amount of packaging used and measures to insure that what we use is reusable first and then recyclable is a major task for the new century. The EPA estimates that 1/3 of all the solid waste generated comes directly from packaging materials. The breakdown of the packaging materials that end up in the landfill is; 33% paper & gray board, 25% plastic, 16% wood, 15% glass, 7% metal and 4% composites.

One of the most difficult areas to implement change in is the food industry. The increased consumption and availability of "packaged" foods and take-out has helped to double the waste stream volume. Packaging is not all bad. It has helped to make fresh produce available in off seasons and has been a factor in food contamination. But over packaged products are becoming the norm. Read boxes carefully to see what you are getting.

Packaging uses many natural resources, causes air and water pollution and wastes valuable land-fill space. It is often unnecessary. The only way to start climinating it is from the grass roots level. Refuse what you do not need. Think before you purchase. REUSE!! Let companies know that you do not want their product to come wrapped up in a lot of stuff and help them to realize how much over packaging costs them.

What can YOU do to help decrease packaging waste?? Be a Waste-Buster and try a few of these out.

- * Bring Your Own Reusable produce bags to the store. Also bring your own cloth grocery sacks.
- * Bring your own drink mug
- * Buy in bulk
- * Do not use packaging peanuts. Try crushed newspapers.
- * Eat out at fast food places less.
- * Pay attention to which fast food places you frequent. Some have cut back on packaging and use materials that contain post-consumer recycled materials
- * Do not allow stores to wrap, box or bag items if unnecessary.
- Think of ways to reuse packaging.
- * Tell suppliers if they have over packaged a product. This works. I wrote to one company about a plastic toy that had been wrapped in plastic and grayboard and then placed in a box. I calculated the cost of packaging verses the actual toy and found that the packaging cost 65% of the toy cost. They eventually changed to a plastic tube and eliminated all the rest. They also sent me a gift certificate for another toy.

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
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
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
