It seems that all of us have forgotten all too quickly just what a pitcher this cat was. His induction into The Hall has induced paroxysms of outrage from the S.I. Cognoscenti, as well as the wizened old geezers of the "Baseball Monthly" persuasion, such as myself.

Who belongs in the Hall of Fame and who doesn't is an eternal argument, as it should be; when we all agree who is the greatest then baseball has lost its spice, savor, and verve.

But there are some keys to the gates of logic here. Again, Bill James has much to say. Let's benefit from his work and take a closer look at Mr. Niekro.

The party line of the Anti-Niekro Lobby, repeated ad nauseum, went something like: "Niekro's record (318-274) is more of a testament to longevity than excellence."

It would make someone a nice challenge to write a research paper quantifying the value of long life and quality, and the exclusion of the two, and then explaining Spahn, or Churchill, or maybe your mother.

In the Second Historical Abstract, one of James' more memorable passages detailed a conversation between a writer & an 80 year old fan in the Fenway seats. This man, having seen every Sox from Ruth to Rice, responded to the obvious question; "The Best? Fred Lynn. Don't think much of him now, but for a few years there, he was the best."

Possible. But consider, Fred Lynn was eliminated from Hall of Fame contention this year.

He is not alone, of course. The rigors and awful demands of this game reap a grim harvest every year. Fred had a real problem with outfield walls. Others of similar caliber have fallen victim to fast cars, women, drugs, booze, insanity, disease, suicide and so on. Niekro lasted. And lasted. Give him some bloody credit.

James correctly points out the difference between "peak value", of the one or two year phenom, and "career value", the whole of the man's worth over the years. Obviously, Koufax would have a huge peak value compared to Jesse Haines, while both are Hall of Famers. But, how to compare on a season to season basis?

What you do is compare the pitcher's record over his career to his team when he wasn't pitching. If you accept James' figures the results are stunning in Niekro's case. Consider also that this guy pitched in front of inferior teams virtually his whole career, and in a ball park that was nicknamed "The Launching

The upshot of this whole muddle is, Phil Niekro, by James' math, is this; given the team he played for, the yard he pitched in, and the league ERA, during his career this guy won 39.6 games more than he should have. Unimpressed? Check this partial list of right handed pitchers already in the Hall of Fame.




