The state republican convention which met in Portland on Wednesday, nominated Judge W. P. Lord of Marion county, for governor. He was nominated on the first ballot. H. R. Kincaid, of Lane was nominated for secretary of state. Phil Metcham, of Grant, for state treasurer. C. E. Woolworth, of Lane, for supreme judge. C. M. Ideman, of Multnomah, attorney-general. G. M. Irwin, of Union, superintendent of public instruction.

The late disgusting and shameful trial lately held in the national capital, between U. S. Congressman Breckenridge of Kentucky and Miss Madeline Pollard, is a disgrace to this nation. The honorable (?) congressman gave testimony in open court of how he, a man old enough to be grandfather to Miss Pollard had fondled and toyed with the woman. In the afternoon session the chair spoke on the subject of "Consecration." After which a consecration meeting was held. Deacon voted on credential on the same standard as he was in M. E. church. E. E. McVicker was granted license to preach. After transaction of other business, and song and prayer, closed at 4:30 to meet at 9 a. m. next morning.

April 6.—Roll call at 9 a. m. followed by devotional exercises. Serious committee gave part and full reports on serious subjects. It was voted that the next annual conference be held at East Portland, beginning first Thursday in April 1895. Closed to meet at 1:30 p. m. Met at 1:30 p. m. Greetings were received from Illinois conference. Professor Bowman of Lafayette was called on to make an address on educational interests. C. C. Poling was elected to collect funds for the Lafayette college. Adjourned.
