## ORDINANCE NO. 39.

Ordinance fixing the fees and com-  
pensation of city marshal and street  
commissioner for collecting special tax.

The people of the city of Dayton do  
ordain as follows:  
Section 1. The city marshal and street  
commissioner shall receive for his fees  
for collecting all special taxes two and  
one-half (2 1/2) per centum, and turn over  
all moneys so collected to the city treas-  
urer, and take his receipt therefor.  
This ordinance shall take effect on its  
passage and approval of the city  
mayor.
