The fourteenth annual convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union for the State of Oregon, was held in the Friends church at Newberg, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday last week. There was a good attendance of visitors, besides over 130 delegates and officers from the various counties of the state. The convention was welcomed by addresses from Mayor Emery, and Rev. Gerard, showing that the work of the W. C. T. U. is understood and appreciated outside of our own ranks. Mrs. Kinney of Astoria, state president delivered her annual address. She reviewed the work accomplished during the year, both in temperance and other lines of work undertaken by the organization, and showed that very encouraging progress had been made.

Tuesday evening was occupied by a gold medal contest, in which 8 young ladies and gentlemen from different towns and counties of the state participated. The medal was awarded to Miss Wright of Newberg. An inspiring sight was that of some of our future prohibitionists—the boys and girls of the Loyal Temperance Legion, marching through the aisles of the church, carrying banners and singing temperance songs. The audience arose and applauded them with the Chautauqua salute.

Wednesday and Thursday were mostly taken up by the reports of superintendents of various departments of work carried on by the Union. Among these are evangelistic, Sunday-school, jail and prison, Sabbath observance, systematic giving, work among railroad employees, mother's meetings, health and heredity, narcotics, Indian work, scientific temperance instruction in public schools, peace, mercy, purity, work among foreigners, &c. Our affiliated interests, the refuge home, and our state periodical, the Oregon White Ribbon, were reported by Mrs. Anna K. Riggs of Portland. On Thursday evening was held the matrons' contest, in which seven old and middle-aged ladies recited selections on temperance, woman suffrage, &c. The "silver gray medal" was awarded to Mrs. Edington of Sherman county. During the evening "The Old Oaken Bucket" was sung by a choir of gray-haired old ladies. Miss Katherine Glen of Dayton, also sang a solo. Thus closed the convention, which, from first to last, was full of interest. The devotion of White Ribboners to their cause was manifested in the collections, which amounted to over \$70; no small sum these hard times. Free entertainment was furnished for both visitors and delegates by the people of Newberg. Dinner was served in the basement of the large church. Over 200 persons sitting down to a bountiful repast each day.

We take the following extracts, in regard to the coming convention (the twentieth anniversary), of the Music Teachers' National Association, from the Denver Republican, which outlines the steps being taken in arranging the preliminaries by the local committee, and indicates to a degree the interest the citizens of this enterprising city are taking in the important event:

"The music teachers of Denver are very busy in preparing for the great convention of music teachers, which is to be held in this city from July 7 to 10. The various committees on programs and entertainments are working to make the convention the red-letter day in the history of the Association. Everybody is working with enthusiasm. The following are the men who will conduct the affairs during the meeting:

E. R. Kroeger, president, of St. Louis; Dr. H. S. Perkins, (26 Van Buren street), Chicago, secretary; W. J. Whitman of Colorado, vice-president. The program committee is composed of Carlos Sorbino of Denver; Mrs. Nellie Strong-Stevenson, of St. Louis, and H. W. Green, of New York City. Executive committee, to whom is entrusted the local business interests, is Hon. Oscar Reuter, Jeanette F. Hall, and Dr. C. E. Tennant. Auxiliary committee on finances includes Aaron Grove, superintendent of schools, Herbert Griggs, and Dr. Geo. C. Baker. Hon. A. W. McLure, Governor of Colorado; Hon. T. S. McMurray, Mayor of Denver.

Trinity church, which has a spacious audience room and a large organ, has been secured for the occasion. Denver will try to show to the musical world what she can do on that occasion. A large orchestra will be secured. It is expected that a very large number will come to Denver from all parts of the country to attend the convention."

On Monday forenoon it was discovered that Oka Johnson, a Swede living across the street from Wm. Macy's, in Macy's addition to Dayton, had committed suicide by strangling himself with a rope. He had a piece of board across the doorway in his barn to keep his horse from backing out, to this, which was only about 4 feet from the floor, he tied a rope and making a slip noose placed it around neck and thus strangled himself to death. He was first seen by a son of S. R. Young who lives near by, and who was plowing for Johnson. At first supposed that Johnson was sitting in the doorway, as his face was towards him, but soon it entered his mind that all was not right, and upon investigation the young man found that he was dead. He immediately informed Mr. Hatfield and others of the fact. Coroner Daniels was sent for, who upon his arrival summoned a jury who rendered a verdict in accordance with the above facts. The funeral was on Tuesday morning, Rev. Belknap preaching the sermon. Deceased was about 55 years of age, and has no known relatives in the U. S. A sister is living in Copenhagen, and other relatives in Sweden. He came here from the mines in Colorado about two years ago. He was a quiet peaceable citizen, but insane at times, when he wanted to commit suicide. About a year ago he was sent to the insane asylum, where he remained several weeks. On Sunday he attended church, and remained over night at Mr. Pearson's; going home early in the morning, and soon after his arrival there ended his existence.
