There has been almost a contin-
uous downpour of rain the past
week. The Willamette river has
overflowed its banks in places and
done some damage. At Salem the
water in the river is 12 feet above
low water mark. The docks there
are all covered with water. The
Yamhill river at this place has
raised about 22 feet above low
water. From Saturday morning
until Tuesday the river raised 17
feet. There is now plenty of water
in the ground and river for all prac-
tical purposes.

The steamer Toledo lies sub-
merged in the Willamette, below
Mission, directly on the east side
of the river from Fred Crawford's
place. Mr. Geer, we are informed
has let the contract of raising the
boat and taking it to Portland
for repairs, to men who are ac-
customed to doing that work.
The Modoc on her last trip up
brought several pieces of timber
and other material to be used in
raising the Toledo. It is hoped
that Mr. Geer will soon have his
boat repaired and running. He
has been very unfortunate.

John Moore has sold from the
product of one vine this year,
about 1000 pounds of grapes. He
received from 1 to 4 cents per pound,
the latter was the price received for
a lot sent to the coast. Beside the
amount sold, a large quantity were
given away and consumed at home.
The vine was set out by General
Palmer, Mrs. Moore's father, on the
old home place many years ago.
Notwithstanding the short fruit
crop, Mr. Moore claims that he has
made more from his fruit than all
the rest of the farm. We believe
he has, and would advise all farm-
ers and those having land to set out
and properly cultivate orchards, as
they will find them a sure source
of profit.

Since the combination between
the steamboat and railroad compa-
nies to raise freight rates, the
freight teams which have been run-
ning between here and McMinn-
ville and other towns in the county,
have been taken off. The reason
for this is that freight rates are now
as high by boats as they are by rail,
and river towns have no advantage
over railroad and interior towns,
in respect to low freight rates. All
are on equal footing. It would ap-
pear to an observer that some one
would be the loser by this combine,
—and that it will not be the railroad
company. Perhaps the Dayton boat
—the Toledo—the "people's portion"
—will come in to bear a portion of
what will result in the loss of traffic
by river. However, Mr. Geer is a
routier and understands his busi-
ness and certainly has studied and
taken in the situation.
