A fire in the lumber yard at the opening of the Cannell locks on Thursday, Nov. 5. The locks are free to all traffic.

The republicans and sound money democrats held a rousing ratification meeting at Portland on last Wednesday.

In connection with the starting of factories in Ohio after the election, on the 5th electric connection was made between McKinley's home at Canton and a large factory at Tonawanda, Major McKinley touched the button and the factory wheels started.

George F. McConnell, for several years keeper of records and seals of the Oregon Knights of Pythias, and defaulting with funds of the order, went to British Columbia, was brought back to Portland by an officer. He pleaded guilty to three or five indictments against him. He was sentenced three, two and one years respectively to the penitentiary. McConnell's downfall was brought about by whisky and cards.

Mrs. Abbie Lawrence, of Portland, came near being smothered to death last week in a bed. Feeling sick as she retired at night, in her haste to lay down, forgot to fasten the bed so that it would not close together. She had only touched the bed as she laid down, when she found herself imprisoned in its folds. Fortunately for her a messenger boy arrived at the house with a message for Mrs. Lawrence, rapping at her door and receiving rapidly, the boy then went to the landlady, who entered Mrs. Lawrence's room with a pass key, and finding the situation in which that lady was placed, and the bed was opened. Mrs. L. was found apparently dead with a bleeding bruise on her forehead. A doctor was sent for and she was rescued from death.

Martino Gomez, a former well known gambler of Portland, is an influential staff officer to Captain General Weyler of the Spanish forces at Havana. Gomez, or Abrego, which is his correct name, belongs to a once very wealthy Mexican family, says the Portland Telegram, in Southern California. He received a superior education in the Santa Clara, Cal., Jesuit college. The information as to Gomez being one of Weyler's staff officers is given by Willie Hartwig, a former Portlander, but now in Havana, who writes that one day he had business at the captain-general's palace, where the first officer he met asked him if he was not from Portland, Oregon. Replying in the affirmative the officer introduced himself as Colonel Martino Abrego, once known in Portland as Gomez.

About 7 o'clock last Saturday night the double building belonging to C. E. Hoskins at Springbrook, built and used for a fruit evaporator, caught fire and burned to the ground. Mr. Hoskins was at Newberg when the fire was first discovered and the building was pretty well buried before he reached home. The fire is supposed to have started from fire in the furnace, as the dryer was running on light work. By hard work on the part of the neighbors who came at the first alarm, the residence was saved from the destructive work of the flames. Besides the loss of the dryer, Mr. Hoskins lost something like two tons of dried fruit, as well as fruit boxes, machinery and other things in the building, which all told amounted to a loss of something like \$2000. No insurance.

It has been provided that no transparencies should have place in the parade without first passing scrutiny of committee on arrangements, to the end that all gringing and sneering mottoes might be expunged. It is expected that the state house will be beautifully illuminated, and that the whole city will be brightly illuminated with electric and gas lights, candles and fireworks. There will be brass and string bands, drum and fire corps, military and every thing attractive for the success of a grand and glorious good-natured jollification, that it will be a pleasure for everybody to attend.

Shippers are not well pleased at the combine between the railroad and steamboat men, which has raised rates on the river, and there is considerable "kicking" being done, which may result in several opposition boats being placed on the Willamette and Yamhill rivers. The Daily Oregon Statesman says, George Collins and F. N. Derby are considering the matter of leasing a steamboat and placing it on the route between Portland and Salem. They have canvassed the business portion of the city and have secured a large list of merchants who pledge their support to the independent steamer with the understanding that the rate for hauling freight will be 124 cents per one hundred pound.
