Our recent short trip over various Oregon roads gives a fair example of varieties and conditions of roads to be found in Oregon. We left Dayton Thanksgiving, which it will be remembered was a pleasant day, only slightly cold, and made our way through the mud to Salem. Thence through more mud to Stayton, where on the morning of the 27th, the mercury stood at 4 above zero. Thence we went up the North Santiam as far as Gates, which place we found to be quite a mining center. This we found to be quite a departure from the agricultural life of the valley. We next returned to Lyons, having been well up into the hills adjacent to the Cascade, finding a vast change from valley atmosphere, and followed the rapid and thrilling course of the North Santiam. We took our departure from Lyons, driving over the red clay and rock hills to Lebanon. These hill roads are a severe test to both team and teamster, as it is an accomplishment to be able to strike all the stones and holes in the road; but we succeeded admirably. From Lebanon we made a trip up the South Santiam as far as Sweet Home, which we consider well named. Thence across the hill to Brownsville, which we find to be a bustling place of a few hundreds of mostly employed people. The woolen mills of Waterloo and Brownsville we consider a grand industry. From that point we take our trip homeward, through mud and water, touching at various places, including Albany, Jefferson and Salem. We could not fail to appreciate the change from mountains to valley. Along the flats between Brownsville and Albany the creeks had overflowed their banks and seemed to lay claim to the roads for their beds. In many places we detected ourselves picking up our feet from the back bed, but never did we have to swim during our trip. We consider the trip a most interesting one. L. BRADLEY.
